Will Fight Storage Tanks

Name Roberts Group Head Of Langstaff Ratepayers

On November 22 a meeting of residents of Langstaff was held at Thornlea School to discuss the revival of a ratepayers' association and the future of Langstaff. Mr. Evans of Cedar Ave., who was president at the closing meeting of the former association five years ago, opened the meeting and explained the purpose of calling it. He then turned the meeting over to Mr. Roberts of Essex Avenue. Mr. Roberts had been spokesman for a group who recently attended a council meeting to protest the infiltration of wrecking yards in this area. At this meeting the group was promised an interview with the planning board, but due to certain technicalities this could not be arranged. A smaller private meeting was held at the home of Mr. Roberts November 16 attended by Mr. Dean, Mr. Maynard, Mr. Forrest, Mr. Lindsay, Mr. Mesure Mr. Evans, Mr. LeMasurier and Mr. Roberts. At this time an effort was made to clarify what Mr. Forrest's ideas were for this area from Yonge Street to Bayview Avenue and south to Holy Cross Cemetery; find out the limits of the industrial area; hear plans about the proposed rezoning, and to find out the position of the planning board in regards to the municipal council. According to the existing by-law of 1952 the area 1,320 feet from the CNR right-of-way is zoned industrial and anything outside that has been residential. It is possible with the planned rezoning that all property from Yonge Street to Bayview and south to Holy Cross Cemetery will be industrial. Mr. Forrest told these representatives he was really acting only in an advisory capacity and that all his plans had to go to council first to be authorized.

Changes are possible if and when it is proved to be the opinion of the majority of the people, he said. Plans for the new Highway 7 are still uncertain. The present highway will probably be only a service road. Essex Avenue is scheduled to be opened through to Bayview where it is planned to build a shopping centre and a school at some future date. It is a possibility that sewers will be laid in this area within two or three years, according to officials. Mr. Roberts went on to report that local roads are in poor shape due to their not being constructed to cope with heavy industrial traffic. If a choice is made it was his opinion that industry with closed storage would be far more acceptable than the present open storage. He told the residents present the main objectives of this meeting was to establish what the residents desire for this area and have it presented to the planning board. It was suggested that if it was necessary to reset boundaries, lines and not by streets. A suggested amendment to the bylaw was instead of it reading that anyone opening up an industry may not reside on the property, it should be altered to encourage families to this area. The meeting felt that people should be permitted to reside on the property, providing suitable homes are erected. Ivan Lindsay checked at the Parliament Buildings regarding permits for erection of gas stations. These permits are useless unless they comply with the requirement of the township, he said. Representatives at the meeting were told that council finds it too expensive to mail individual notices of meetings to every resident but it is hoped that as a ratepayers' association we can

be kept informed of any meetings. Mr. A. Smith, a member of the former ratepayers, moved that a ratepayers' group be established. Nominations and election of officers were carried out. The results were: President, Mr. Roberts, vice-president, Ivan Lindsay; secretary, Mr. Martin; treasurer, Mr. Mesure. After the business meeting a discussion on the amending of boundaries and bylaws was held. It was decided that residents needed time to consider these questions and it was left in abeyance with one resident from each street to conduct a survey to find out people's opinions. A petition in regards to the proposed installation of storage tanks on the northwest corner of Ruggles Avenue was passed around for signing. Apparently it is proposed to install two 10,000 gallon tanks for storage of fuel oil and one 2,000 gallon tank for gasoline.

Car Rams Hydro Pole Hill Area Darkened

Hydro service in Richmond Hill, King City and Oak Ridges was momentarily interrupted Thursday night when a car left the road and knocked down a hydro pole on Highway 11, near Summit Restaurant. The car came to a stop after running into a parked tow truck. Police blocked off the road for an hour until repairs were made. Hydro wires and a transformer landed on the road after the crash. Driver Mrs. Elizabeth McGarth, 35, of King City, escaped with minor cuts and bruises.
