Reeve, Deputy Acclaimed Five Seek Council Seats

Voters in Vaughan Township will not be faced with many difficult decisions Saturday when they name the five members of their 1963-64 council. Both Reeve Albert Rutherford and Deputyreeve Jesse Bryson were acclaimed for a second term at last Monday night's nomination meeting.

Voters will have to pick three councillors from five candidates - only one of whom is a newcomer to municipal politics. The five candidates are incumbents Mrs. Ruth McConkey and Wilfred Keffer, John Neufeld and Milton Savage, Jr., both also-rans in 1960, and newcomer Garnet Williams.

No real issues have come out so far in the campaign. Relations with Metropolitan Toronto, the Edgeley water area, and a new township zoning bylaw have failed to develop into real issues.

A. H. RUTHERFORD, 50, has been in municipal politics since 1949 when he was elected a councillor. He was elected reeve in 1960 in a landslide win over Vic Ryder and Bill Anstey. During the last two years, he has been chairman of council's finance and general purpose committee.

Mr. Rutherford was a councillor from 1949 until 1951, and served as deputyreeve from 1952 until 1956. Before winning the reeve's chair two years ago, he failed in his bids for the reeveship in 1957 and 1958.

As reeve, Mr. Rutherford was a member of York County Council and during the past year served as one of two commissioners to Warden William Sellers.

Born in Bolton, Mr. Rutherford came to the township in 1921, and farmed near Vellore from 1940 until 1956. He now runs an insurance agency near Woodbridge.

Mr. Rutherford is a past master of Woodbridge Masons, a member of Maple Lions Club, past president of King-Vaughan Plowmen, past president of the Woodbridge Agricultural Society and a past president of the York County 4-H Club. He is married, and has a son and a daughter.



Eight In Hunt For Five Openings On Vaughan Public School Board

Eight candidates have been nominated for the five school board posts in Vaughan Township, including

three incumbents. Incumbents are Mrs. Dorothy Robertson, Chairman Sam Kaiser, and Terry Goodwin. Newcomers are Bert Stevenson, M. D. Armstrong, Ross Joliffe, Lorne Wells, and Mrs. Louise Edmanson.

This year's school board campaign promises to spark more fireworks than elections for council.

Biggest issue is the present board's handling of Oral French. There has been criticism of the board's decision to ask council to hold a plebiscite on the matter. Council was unable to give three readings to the bylaw because of procedure.

Only other possible issue will be the board's acceptance of a \$78,000 overgrant from the province.
