

Predict 80,000 People By 1980

Markham Township should have a population of over 80,000 by 1980. This is the forecast for the area contained in the township's new Street to Leslie Street; Green Lane from Bayview to Con. 5; Con. 5 from Steeles to Highway 7; Highway 7 from Yonge to Con. 5; and Seventeenth Avenue from Bayview to the proposed Highway 404.

Two limited access highways will cross the township by 1980. They are Highway 404, a north-south artery and an unnamed provincial highway which will cross the southern part of the township in an east-west direction.

Expected industrial area in the township will be 2,271.4 acres. The largest industrial areas will be Langstaff (737.9 acres) and Don Mills (754.4 acres).

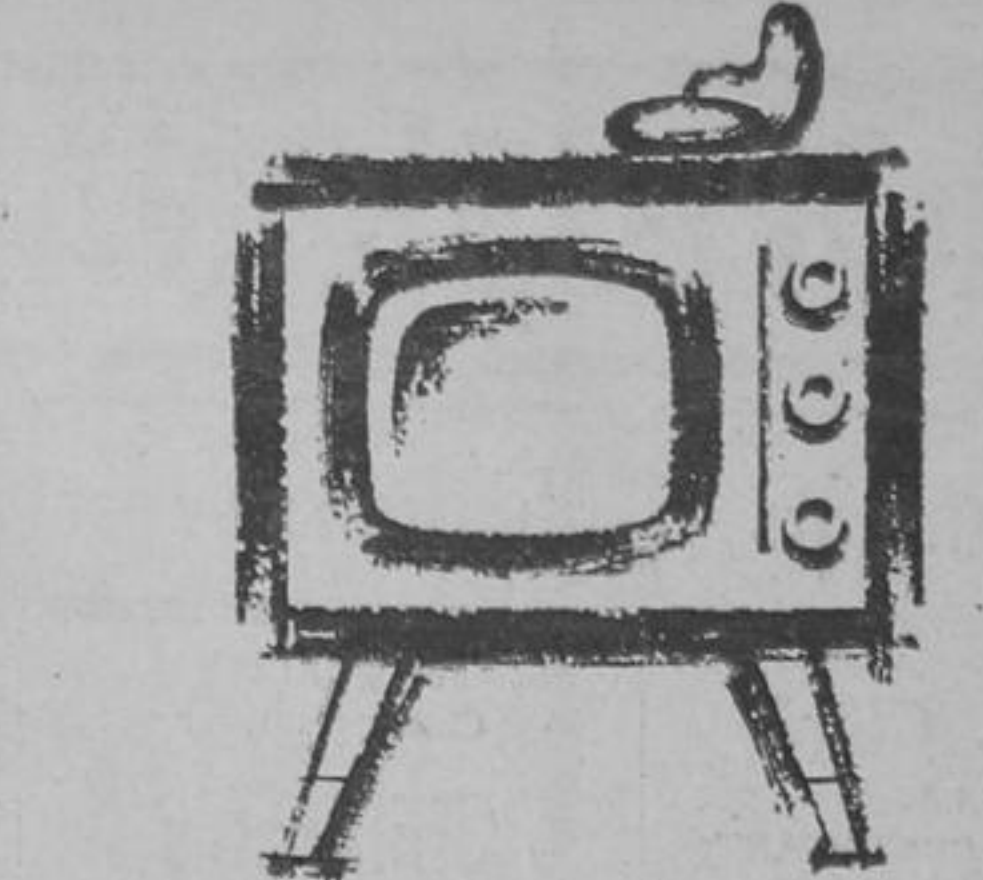

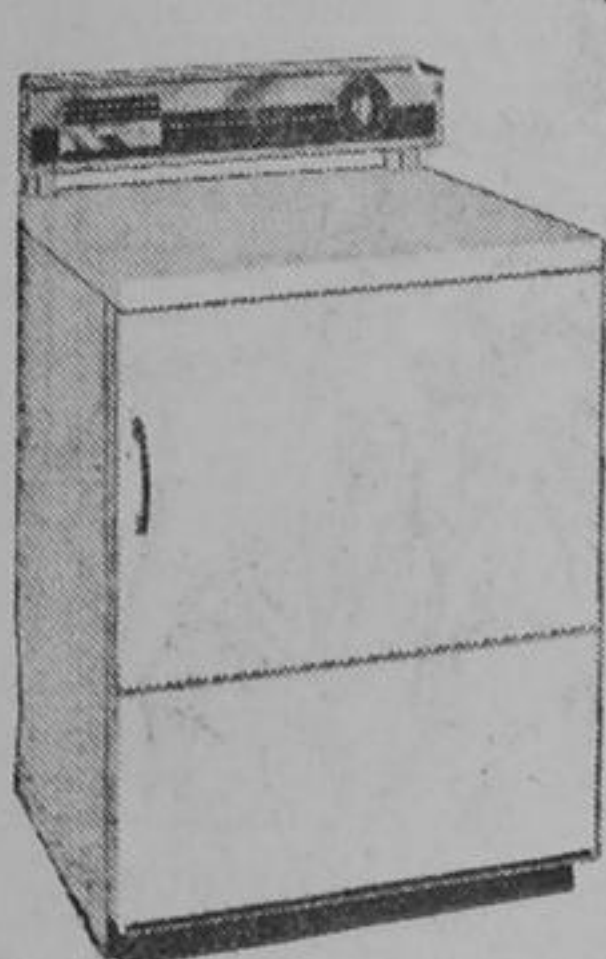
