York Roads Not Adequate

North Gwillimbury Townships would be the only parts of the county to serve as "reception centres" for evacuees.
Section six is completed with a discussion of remedial evacuation of "persons who have been unavoidably detained in an area affected by radioactive fallout". This evacuation could not take place until at least 48 hours after the attack. Much of section seven is incomplete, since it deals with service and municipal plans.
All members of local police forces would, in times of emergency, become part of York County Emergency Measures Organization Police.
Prime aim of the police service outlined in the plan would be to "isolate a disaster area from non-emergency personnel", to open and maintain emergency routes, to assist the

other services, to maintain law and order, and to control mob hysteria and panic.
A detailed emergency measures program for York County Hospital calls an emergency resulting in 15 to 30 casualties a minor disaster and in 25 to 60 casualties a major disaster. Another part of the section deals with a rescue service plan.
Plans not now available for this section are those of all the municipalities, and for fire, health, welfare, engineering, communications, radiological, and wardens.
Section Eight, dealing with natural disasters, is also incomplete.
A plan for schools is the subject of section nine. Schools would be warned either by telephone or by radio. The plan calls for

school authorities to attempt to reunite the children with their parents.
Intensification of fire drill practice, choice of a suitable shelter, purchase of a battery-operated radio, and purchase of at least forty-eight hours supply of canned foods are some of the steps recommended to school authorities in the plan.
Section ten deals with standard operational procedures. Sections eleven and twelve deal with review and amendment with distribution, respectively.
Similar plans are being drafted by counties across the province right now.
