(Continued From Page 1) ideas, which is a healthy sign. Many things attract their attention. A film "Frustrating Fours and Fascinating Fives" was recommended. At this age when attention is so easily distracted, and flits from one interesting thing to another, a helping hand along the way is needed, along with direction. Getting him started on the job of his snowsuit, or shoes, or toys being put away is the step for parents to take, although he may do most of the task himself. Learning is a continuous thing; you can learn all the time. In summing up, Mrs. Hewson stated that even adults are only accomplishing about one-half of their potential. Emotions hold us back as uncertainty enters the picture, and this can often be traced back to the amount of encouragement received. Use as few rules as possible carrying them through making sure to revise them to fit age and development. Try to avoid exasperation. Children know themselves when they are "measuring up."

intimated it will hear submissions from Richmond Hill officials, Mr. Deeks told the meeting. "We should not have to go hat-in-hand to be heard," board member Ross Scrimger said. Richmond Hill has never recognized Mr. Griffin as its representative on the Metro authority.

### Vaughan Council Notes

Vaughan Township Council Monday night withheld its decision on an application from J. Grant to have a \$32,000 maintenance bond on Normale Subdivision replaced by other securities.

Also held over was a request from A. Sadler to have part of the holdback of \$10,000 on his Emerald Isle Subdivision paid.

The road committee informed council that present winter conditions make it difficult to estimate the requirements needed to bring the two subdivisions up to standard and asked that no decision be made at this time.

Anticipated road expenditures for 1963 are estimated at \$210,000 excluding supplementary spending, council was informed by the road committee.

A bylaw to approve the installation of short-arm gates in addition to existing flashing lights and bell at the CNR crossing on Steele Avenue was passed by council.

Plans for a separated grade to be constructed by the CNR on Con. 6 will be studied by the township engineer before approval will be given by the township.

Council will call tenders for two new police cruisers and an additional car for Police Chief J. W. Davidson. The chief told the fire and police committee the two vehicles had run close to 60,000 miles and should be replaced. At present the chief is using his own car and is being paid on a mileage basis.
