

As most ice fishermen know, it is the accepted thing to catch herring using buttons for bait. The accepted practice is to straighten out the eye of the (Continued on page 10)





Here's Safety Hints For Lake Fishermen

ings.


With below zero temperatures prevailing in most of the northern part of the Lake Simcoe district during the past few days, conservation officers expect ice conditions should be generally good this coming weekend.

However, even when the ice has reached a thickness considered safe for vehicles, there are certain dangers, which anyone, not familiar with the lake, should be aware of.

Cracks frequently occur in the ice and under certain conditions may separate leaving open stretches of water which can't be seen from a distance. Similarly holes cut by fishermen provide a dangerous trap for vehicles and unwary walk-

For safety sake it is recommended that uncovered holes, left in the ice by fishermen, be marked in some conspicuous manner.
