Report Increase Of Nearly 500

King Township population at the end of 1962 was 12,521, an increase of 400 to 500 over the 1961 total, according to Township Assessor E. S. Redick.

Largest centres are King City with a population of 1,850, Nobleton, 895, and Schomberg, 578.

Total assessment for 1963 is \$1,108,920, an increase of \$282,568 over 1962.

Coupled with \$192,120 from new homes now under construction, total increase will be \$474,688.

Assessment for the township's police villages are: King City, \$1,925,285, Nobleton \$1,056,146, Schomberg \$783,930 and Holland Marsh, \$923,265.

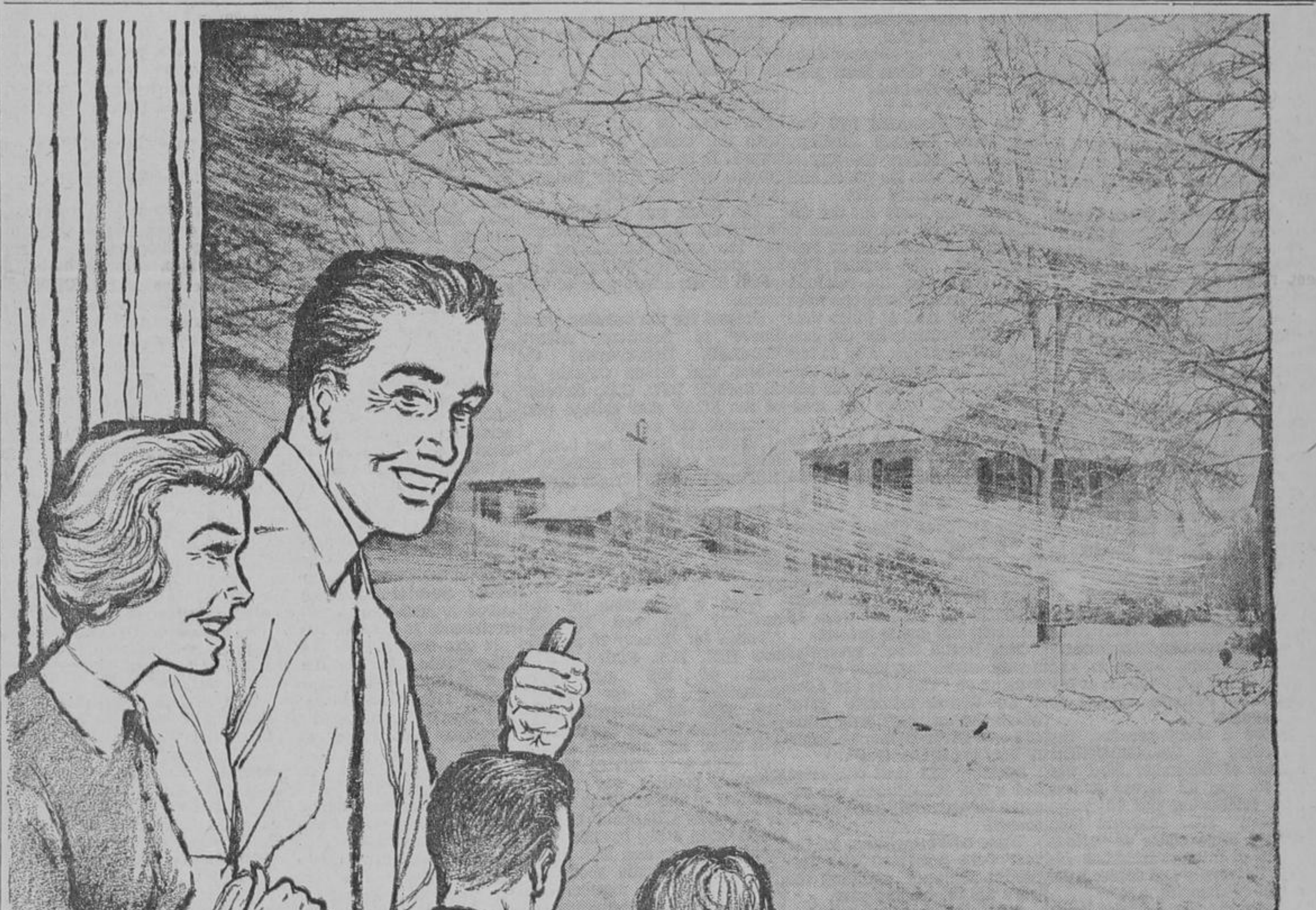
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
