Name R. Bolton To Top Post

Ronald Bolton was named "inspecting trustee" or chairman for 1963 when King City Village Trustees officially took office January 21. Since trustees had joined with King Township Council and trustees of Nobleton and Schomberg for inaugural ceremonies the beginning of January, King City officials dispensed with formalities and quickly settled down to business at their own meeting.

Fisher Street property owners M.S. Donald Findlay and Carlton Crossley, requesting the street be reconstructed. He blamed the publicity given the village's "grave" water shortage for "the damaging effect on house building and sales".
