Markham School Area

Approve Salary Raise

Trustee Mrs. Louise Aimone announced at the March 12 meeting of the Board of T.S.A. No. 1 Markham that changes in the board's salary schedule have been accepted by the teachers federation. In category 4, teachers with a B.A. degree, the minimum has been raised from \$4,300 to \$4,500 and the maximum raised from \$7,500 to

In category 5, teachers with a B.A. and additional degrees, minimum has been raised from \$4,600 to \$4,800 and the maximum raised from \$8,100 to \$8,200.

Instead of adopting a separate salary scale for principals, as requested by the principals, the board has instead made some increases in the amount of money paid to principals, depending on their responsibility. Principals of three room schools will get their regular teachers salary, plus an additional \$1,000 per year instead of an additional \$700. The additional amount paid to principals of four to seven room schools will be \$1,300 instead of \$1,000; of eight to eleven room schools it will be \$1,600 instead of \$1,300. Principals of schools with 12 or more rooms will receive an additional \$1,800. These changes have been accepted by the board.


