"In fact," he said, "I have never spent so much time working at anything as I have recently for the school board." He added with a smile, "And I don't even get paid for it." However

The township board ended the year 1961 with an apparent surplus of \$78,682.43, and it was not until after the 1962 budget had been set and had been included in the township council's budget that the staff discovered the overpayment of grant. When they drew it to the attention of the department, that body agreed that it could be paid back in two instalments one-third in 1962 and two-thirds in 1963.

Last year \$26,227.47 was repaid and the balance of \$52,455.95 remains to be paid this year. To offset this amount, according to the annual finance report for 1962 presented to the board at its regular meeting Thursday, receipts during that year exceeded expenditures by the amount of \$38,286.90, leaving \$14,228.48 to be raised in this year's rate.
