The report of the police department for the month of March revealed a total of 696 calls were answered. Fifteen accidents, 17 domestic complaints, 7 false pretences, 9 liquor seizures, six thefts, 3 burglarles were investigated. The cruisers travelled 10,751 miles during the month at an operating cost of \$394.93.

Dr. Wilson told council that the construction of senior citizens' accommodation was a three-way deal with the federal government assuming 90 per cent of the cost and the provincial government assuming five per cent. The remaining five percent, Dr. Wilson said, was

usually contributed by outright grants from such sources as service clubs, church organizations or similar bodies.
