> All costs are borne by the library board, as no other ar rangement is legally feasible. The public school board has supported the library board each year in its budget presentation to town council.

The budget for children's books in 1962 was \$4,639.15 for 1,967 books. The amount spent on books for schools was \$3,-226.10 or two-thirds of the total, bringing the average cost of books to \$2.36.

The average cost of the programme per class was \$62.65 per year.

This programme is handled completely by a professionally trained children's librarian. At present, 63 percent of her time is spent in preparing boxes and 73% of her salary (separate quests for special materials,
