Mr. Bunten estimated 90 per cent were addicted. Since drugs could cost \$30 a day and the victims couldn't earn the money legally, the men turn to atealing and the women to prostitution, he said.

The speaker found many of the probationers had no church affiliation and hadn't had the opportunity to belong to organized activities, such as sports sponsored the year around by the Lions' Club.


