

A brief prepared by a committee of ratepayers in Vaughan Township who oppose the introduction of Oral French into grade 5 of the township's public schools in September was considered at a committee meeting of Vaughan Township School Area Board Thursday evening.

A copy of the brief which has been forwarded to the minister of education, was sent to the school board with the information that a petition is being circulated with the intention of presenting it at the April 11th meeting of the board. 


