SCARBORO: While Scarboro Council have not allowed for it in the 1963 budget, it is hoped that Scarboro General Hospital will add 400 beds to the present institution. Dr. John Neilson of the Ontario Hospital Services Commission said the plans could materialize if full financing can be arranged. Expected cost is close to six million dollars.
Half of the total number of beds would be provided by building a new 200-bed hospital and the remainder would come through a hospital expansion program.

St. Matthews Players Present Drama
In centuries past, dramatization of Christian epics was an integral part of the church's teaching. On Easter Sunday evening, St. Matthew's United Church was the lovely setting for just such a dramatization, "Into Thy Kingdom" by Dorothy Clarke Wilson, presented by the newly formed St. Matthew's Players.
After a short evening service, Rev. William Patterson introduced the one-act play the action of which takes place in Jerusalem and concerns the household of Caiaphas, the Jewish high priest. The dramatic story of how Christianity wins the heart of Adena the wife of Caiaphas, unfolds as the sun rises on the first Easter morning. The chancel of the church becomes, for the congregation, the sunrise chamber of the palace and the three crosses on the distant hill seen from the balcony are mute evidence to the Crucifixion.
The authentic note throughout the play is heightened by the appearance of Nicodemus who is recorded in the Bible to have served Jesus in secret and to have helped Joseph of Arimathea to bury Jesus' body. The prophetic words of Caiaphas brings the play to a close as he says "After All, Thou hast won," and the sun shines full upon the Cross.
The cast, under the able direction of Lucille Urquhart, included Caiaphas played by Bud Renshaw; Adina, wife of Caiaphas, Lynda Davis; Malchus, servant to Caiaphas by John Anderson; Nicodemus played by Neil Crowe; Tama, Adina's servant, is played by Joan Plume and a Roman soldier by Mike Davis. Dawson Lang plays a robber and Doreen Kendry, a girl in the robber band. The costumes were rich in color and beautiful in the soft lights by Anna Derry and Unetta Joyce.
