# Slight Reduction School Mill Rate

"There is no policy in the elementary schools of adjusting marks to maintain teaching averages," firmly stated Mr. Maynard Hallman, inspector of the York 3 area, addressing the annual public relations meeting of the Board of T.S.A. No. 1 Markham on April 9th.

Mr. Hallman was answering a question from the floor. He went on to state that the principal in each school is responsible for promotions, following the recommendations of the classroom teacher. The teachers and the principals are very reasonable he asserted and he had heard no complaints on this score. He suggested that if the records of a particular school indicated that pupils with high marks had low success in secondary school, the inspector might try to assist the teacher and principal to see that the marks are more realistic.
