Last Friday evening signalled the end of a long and often arduous task for officials, coaches and executive members of the Richmond Hill Minor Hockey Association, for this season, that is: Next fall most of them will be back in harness at the old stand - providing organized hockey for kids.

To end the season on a high note a big night was planned for last Friday at Richmond Hill Arena. Four final league championships were decided and trophies were presented to winning teams as well as to individual players. Lucky draw prizes were on the agenda but no big name celebrities were on hand to draw a crowd. The crowds turned out anyway and those who stayed until the very end saw four tremendous hockey games. And therein lies a tale.

It wasn't so very many years ago that teams in the R.H.M.H.A. played a type of hockey that could only be likened to shinny. Young players had little if any appreciation of the more formal rules of hockey. Any resemblance to positional or scientific hockey was merely the result of a happy coincidence. Coaches were allowed to go on the ice with their teams in an effort to get hockey lessons across and to get players off on the right foot. How far the R.H.M.H.A. has come from those early beginnings is absolutely incredible!

From the six year olds on up every player knows hockey rules and they are soon taught positional hockey. By the age of eleven or twelve they conduct themselves on the ice like professionals - they know the game and they know their place in the game. Unfortunately some of them have also acquired a few of the unfavourable professional habits and will try to throw the odd fist or knee on occasion. 
