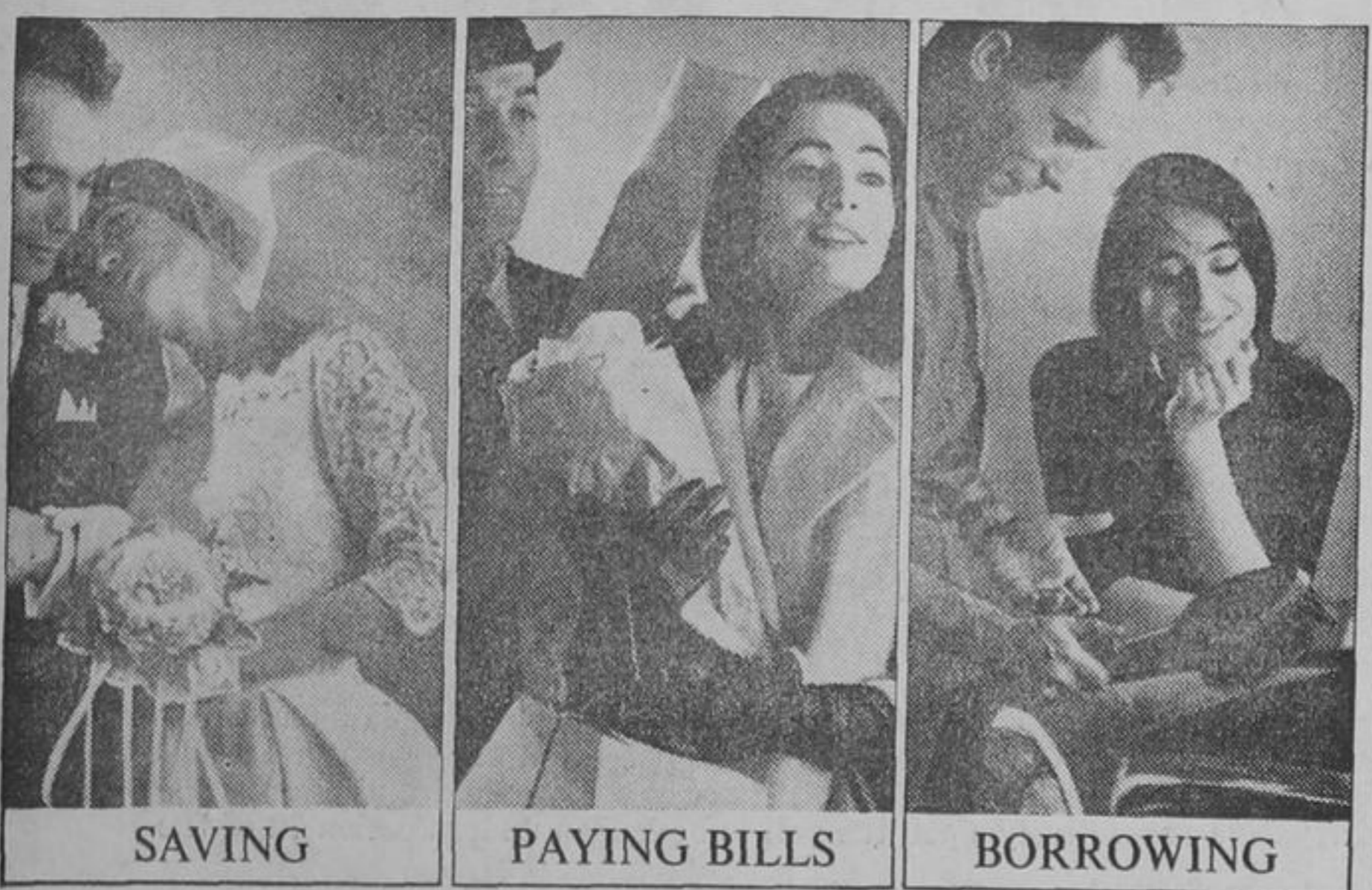

Church News

The position of the church is that in asking parents to respond to the vow to bring their children up in the Christian faith, when they themselves hold no such belief, is an irresponsible action and can only be considered an act of hypocrisy. The following is a condensed statement:

(a) That the Sacrament of infant baptism should normally be administered with the consent of Session, to those children whose parents or guardians, one or both, have been baptized and confirmed, and are in good standing with the church.

(b) That exceptions to this rule of procedure may be made only with the consent of the Session who would share with the parents the responsibility for the Christian upbringing of the child and should require a sponsor to be provided who has been baptized and confirmed and is in good standing with the church and should seek, through the means of grace, to bring the parents into full active communion with the Church.

Public School Bd. Will Seek More Teachers

Nine members of the teaching staff of Richmond Hill public schools have tendered their resignations to take effect as of June 29 and it is anticipated that another two resignations will be received. This information was contained in the report of the superintendent tabled at the last meeting of the public school board.

In view of the resignations the report recommended that the board approve the hiring of three teachers who would not be assigned to classrooms at this time but who would be held on the rosters as spares. This recommendation was put forth in view of the fact that in 1962 it was found necessary to advertise as late as June to replace teachers who submitted their resignations in May.

At that time the board had on staff only two teachers who were not assigned to regular classrooms. By September of 1962 all teachers on staff had been assigned to regular classrooms and in January 1963 it was again found necessary to hire an additional teacher who took over regular classroom duty on April 22.

In addition to the foregoing report points out that a total of 15 or 16 new staff members will be required for the overall system. To fill this requirement seven new teachers have already been hired leaving a total of eight or nine vacancies still to be filled. Advertisements for new staff are now being published and a schedule of interviews have been arranged to commence on May 3 in accordance with the Code of Ethics of the Trustee Council.
