# Thornhill Actors Tops

The Onstage Players of Thornhill Secondary School swept all before them at the finals of the Simpson's Collegiate Drama Festival held at Hart House Theatre last Friday and Saturday.

Not only was their play "The Diary of Anne Frank" adjudged the best in the festival, but two of their number, Alita Wise and Keith Corkill were given the awards as best actress and best actor.
