THE Challenge OF Cancer
The fight against cancer in Canada is spearheaded by two National voluntary organizations - The Canadian Cancer Society and the National Cancer Institute of Canada.
These two organizations work closely with the Federal and Provincial Departments of Health and the treatment agencies; also with the Canadian Medical Association. The Society and the Institute have a joint administrative office and one executive vice-president and treasurer.
