Half-Million Road Program

A provision of 11 mills, or \$605,000 has been recommended by Vaughan Township roads committee for anticipated work during the current year. The work will come under a needs study and maintenance program that had been put into effect by roads committee two years ago. Normal appropriation will total \$210,000 while supplementary appropriation has been estimated at \$395,100, which includes cost of a new \$27,000 grader. Under the normal appropriation is

the following breakdown: ditching \$9,400.00; Pearson Avenue, extension \$3000; Dufferin Street completion

of surface treatment \$6500; drainage and easements \$4600; needs study \$4000; traffic control \$1000; Steeles Ave. CNR crossing \$300; Sherwood crossing \$300; culvert installations \$4500; superintendence and overhead

Of the \$175,000 to be spent on maintenance, dust control will absorb the highest portion with \$55,000 expended on this item. Winter control will take \$45,000, while re-surfacing and gravel accounts for \$30,000. Other maintenance expenses are: surface treatment (Elgin Mills) \$3600; stone and gravel patching \$20,000; ditches, catch basins and tile drains \$1800; weed control \$6000; guard rails and signs \$1000; culvert repairs, \$1000; superintendent and overheard \$11,600.

Widening of Bathurst Street for lots 21 to 25 a total of \$150,000 has been appropriated, with culverts costing an additional \$13,000. Other expenditures in the construction of township roads include: Dufferin Street lots 6 to 10, \$49,200; Elder Mills Sideroad \$43,900; Trench Street extension \$10,600; superintendence and overhead \$25,000.


