Members of Headford United Church united with Browns Corners congregation on the occasion of their 121st anniversary services May 5.

The morning service was taken by Rev. Ernest Howse of Bloor Street United Church. Dr. Howse spoke on applied religion. His message was a penetrating analysis of the dangers that beset a Christian who considers practical humanitarianism full Christian service. People who read, "and Jesus went about doing good" have a tendency to confine Christianity to only 'doing good' Dr. Howse pointed out that this can only end in defeat. With a bit of humour and a rhyme about a woman whose time was consumed in doing good by way of committee meetings and banquet meetings until she died from sheer exhaustion in fruitless activity. Too often, Dr. Howse said, doing good became mainly 'going about'. The necessary other facet in Christian living is declared in the statement that Jesus went alone to pray.

The basic message was that no one can continue to create without personal re-creation. There can be no continued out-go without take-in.

Dr. Howse quoted that 95 per cent of humanitarian services in the world had their inspiration in the church pews but unless the service is upheld through a faith that is born of communion between God and the soul, there can be no lasting good.




