Councillor Rumble asked how one was to define an area. "When I speak of an area I speak of a municipality", he said. The members of the delegation disagreed with this definition. Reeve Wilfred Dean agreed that an area was hard to define, saying "I believe the money should be spent in the subdivision or for expenses incurred by the development of the subdivision, such as roads, water and sewers, necessary additional fire and police protection and municipal buildings.

Asked if there was anything in the Municipal Act which said the money could not be used for schools, Reeve Dean replied that it was up to the council to decide. Councillor Allan Sumner reiterated "It's up to council to decide where it is spent to the best advantage. Council cannot use schools to cut taxes. The money is spent where John Q. 




