The last activity for Senior Citizens Week was held in the Christian Education rooms last week, the weather too inclement for the scheduled garden party.

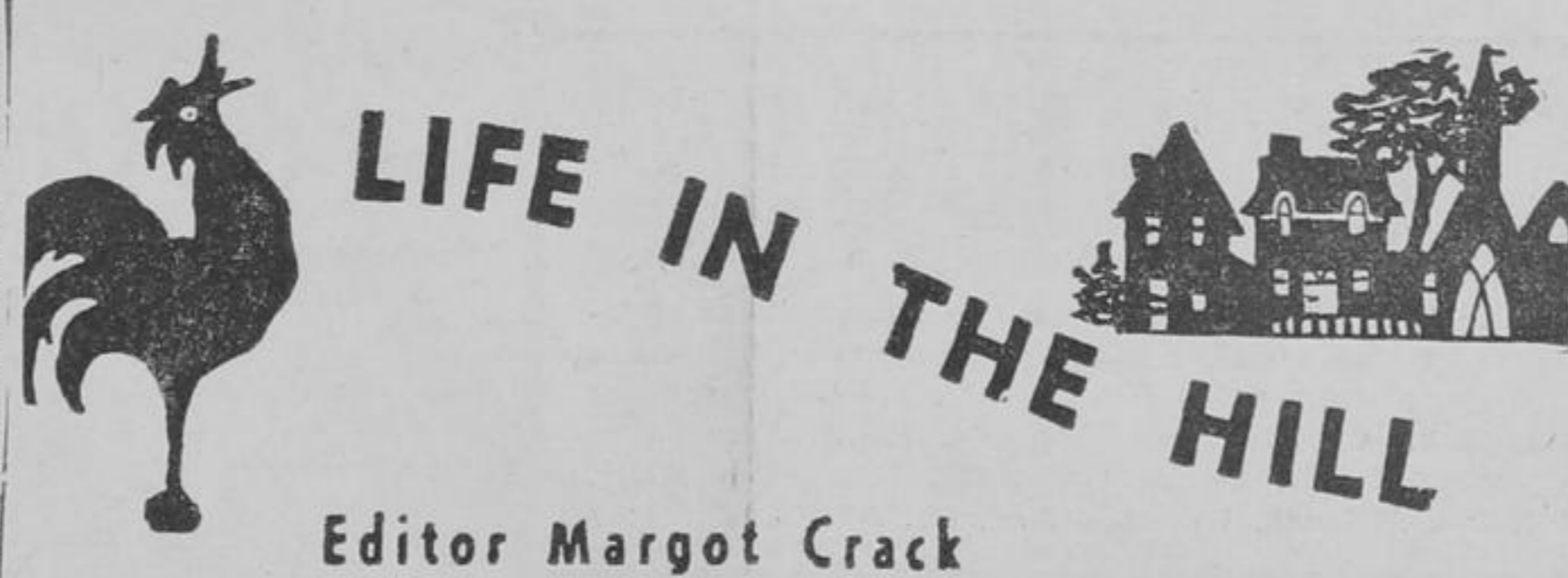

- All research projects are approved by the board of directors of the National Cancer Institute acting on the advice of a research advisory group which selects, supervises and assists the work. This avoids needless duplication and co-ordinates the efforts of widely-separated workers.
- The research advisory group consists of Dr. Charles Leblond, McGill University; Dr. R. L. Noble, University of British Columbia; Dr. R. J. Rossiter and Dr. A. C. Wallace, University of Western Ontario; with two research consultants, Dr. A. W. Ham, and Dr. D. M. Whitelaw, University of Toronto.
