Old Landmark Being Wrecked

Crossley Hall, where famed Canadian E. Pauline Johnson once recited her poems, is a King City landmark fast disappearing to make way for business progress.

The natural pine structure, located beside the Baptist Church on King Sideroad, will soon be replaced by a parking area to accommodate patrons of King City Cold Storage.

Built in 1899, the hall was opened January 1, 1900. Operated by the late William J. Crossley, it soon became a popular social meeting place.

As the only hall located in a large area, the Crossley building functioned until the middle of the first world war.




