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Re-organize Libraries In T.S.A. 1 Markham

At their June 11th meeting trustees of T.S.A. No. 1 Markham accepted a recommendation of the chairman of their education committee, Trustee Louise Aimore, that central libraries be formed at each of the area's five schools. This involves a re-organization of the library books presently in the schools and will bring them all together at a central place in the schools. It is felt that better use will be made of the books in the school by bringing them to a central location where they will be available to a larger number of pupils, and make it possible for pupils to read at different grade levels, either up or down as they require. The libraries will be housed either in available portable classrooms or on the stage in the auditoriums. Moveable book stands are being constructed by members of the maintenance staff and tables and chairs will be grouped informally in the library area.

It was also announced that research and the new arrangement of the film service will be that of the shelves. Any portables used will still qualify for a govern-

ment classroom grant. Individual classrooms will still be served by the travelling library service provided by the Department of Education. The recommendation of the acquisition of a tape library was also accepted at the same meeting. Cost of this program will be limited to \$1,200 for acquisition of a suitable tape recorder (a non-recurring cost) and with this tapes will be made of various educational radio programs. The tapes will make it possible for the teachers to integrate these programs into their classroom lessons where required, instead of having to have classes listen to programs when they do not fit into either the classroom curriculum or the daily schedule.

It was also decided to take advantage of the film service provided by the audio-visual branch of the Department of Education. A block of 25 films will be provided every six weeks. These would consist of six films for each of the primary, intermediate and senior divisions, and even specimen films.

A memorandum was received from Inspector Maynard Hallman with respect to Bill 22 of the Ontario Legislature. This bill permits boards to provide kindergarten classes at the beginning of January each year for children who will have their fifth birthday between January 1st and July 1st of that year. Board members felt that they did not yet know all the implications for staff and accommodation and it would have to be discussed at a later meeting. All inspectors on the York 3 trusteers were to meet to discuss the matter.

The trustees were all given a copy of a brochure prepared by a committee of teachers and principals in connection with the trip to Ottawa to be taken by the grade 8 students in the area schools on June 20 - 22. This consists of several pages of questions and commentary on the geographical and historical features of the area and to be studied by the children in preparation for their trip.

Vaughan Twp. Council Briefs

Vaughan Council Monday approved a \$25 grant for the Muscular Dystrophy Association of Canada following a plea from its honorary chairman Gus Ryder. Mr. Ryder said that unless science soon discovers the cause of muscular dystrophy, 20,000 Canadian victims will have no hope for life; he added that if acceleration in research activity is not matched by an increase in funds to support it, vital time and research talent might be lost.

A possible dumping bylaw infraction will be investigated by Vaughan Police on recommendation by council. The action was recommended after a report from Mr. R. H. MacDonnell of Bridlebrook Farm in Concord complained that effluent from septic tanks

and refuse of all kinds including oil and sludge from service stations was being dumped on property north of his home and was causing him and his family concern. Mr. MacDonnell suggested that the stream within a few feet of his home had become polluted because of the dumping. Vaughan Council meeting was probably a record 20 minute session with Deputy-revere Jesse Bryson, and Councillors Ruth McConkey and Garnet Williams present.
