cipality for dumping or disposing of domestic or industrial waste. * * * * 1. The following area of the

Township of Markham is hereby defined as an area to which the provisions of this by-law shall apply, namely:

The whole of the Township of Markham save and except the east half of the west half of Township Lot 35 and the west half of the east half of Lot 35, Concession 5. law industrial waste shall

(a) Material of any kind which has been obtained from an incinerator; (b) Any material obtained from an abbatoir as a

waste product; (c) Any material obtained from an abbatoir for the purpose of dumping or disposing of such material as waste, refuse or garbage.

law domestic waste shall mean any waste material obtained for disposal elsewhere than on the premises from which such waste has been obtained.

The dumping or disposing of domestic or industrial waste as hereinbefore defined in the said defined area is hereby prohibited.

any breach of the provisions of this by-law shall forfeit and pay in the discretion of the convicting magistrate a penalty not exceeding (exclusive of costs) the sum of \$300.00 for each offence recoverable under the Summary Convictions Act.

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
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
