 tie here. "They only give us the industries they don't want," contended Reeve Perkins, Richmond Hill has been a member of this Metro body for several years now, at an annual fee of \$500. Deputy-reeve Tinker said the local banks have also been helpful in encouraging industry to settle in Richmond Hill. He reported one of the latest industries to settle here had been referred to Richmond Hill by a town bank.

In preparing their report, Councillor Campbell said that he and Mr. Scudts had met with the deputy minister of Economics and Development at Queen's Park, the general manager of the Metro Toronto Industrial Commission, and officials in Brampton, Oakville, Barrie and Toronto Township. The committee discovered a large number of Ontario

municipalities do not have industrial commissioners. This is true in the case of both Brampton and Newmarket, which are comparable in size to Richmond Hill.

A move by Councillor Campbell to have Mr. Langford's final salary settlement referred to the personnel committee was vetoed by Councillor Murphy who insisted that the matter be settled at once by council. Mr. Campbell had suggested that his salary settlement terminate on September 15th. However, in the subsequent debate this date was first moved ahead a month to October 15th and then finally settled on at October 1st.

Mr. Langford was hired in August, 1958, at an annual salary of \$6,000. He has received no increase in salary during that time.

Dr. John Wachna heads the blood services section of the local branch.



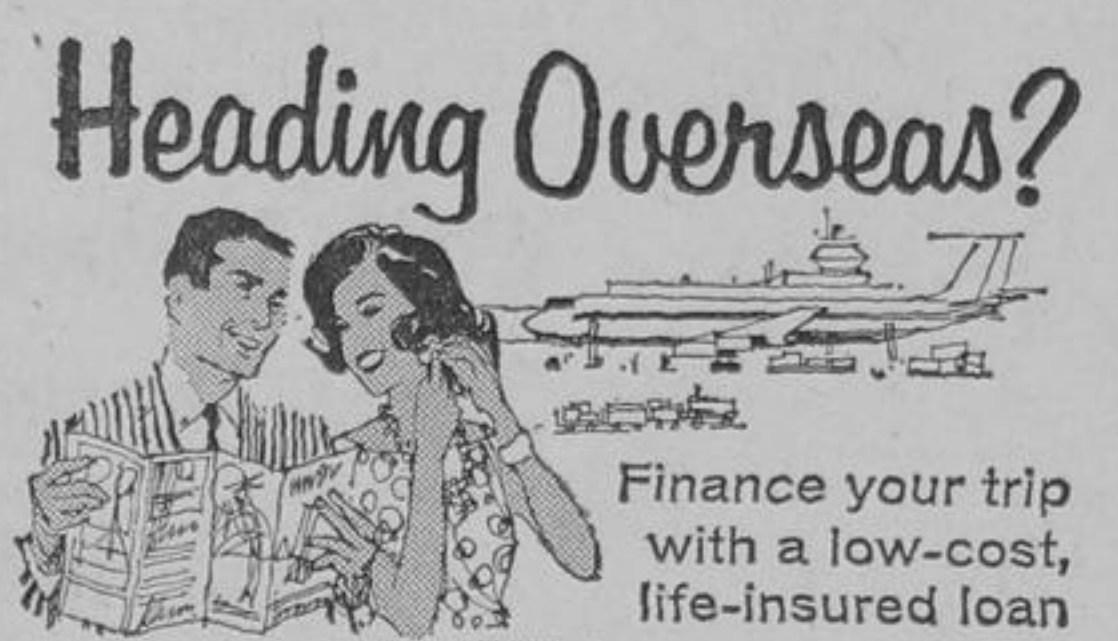

Woman Killed Driver Charged

A Richvale motorist has been charged with dangerous driving following an accident Saturday evening which took the life of an expectant mother south of Richmond Hill, Ontario Provincial Police said.

Mrs. Frances Mavec, Rossmore Rd., Toronto, was killed following a collision between a car driven by Alojzji Mavec and Merlin Graves 9672 Yonge St., Richmond Hill.

Injured was Mr. Mavec and his children, Stella, six, who suffered head and chest injuries, Ivo, three, who suffered a fractured clavicle, and Louis, one, who suffered a fractured left leg. All were reported in fair condition. The children were taken to Sick Children's Hospital and Mr. Mavec to Toronto General Hospital. The Mavec car was southbound and the Graves car northbound.

In Magistrates Court

Gordon Joseph Flannigan charged with driving while disqualified in King City was given a remand to August 13.

Ronald Leslie Tucker of Richmond Hill was fined \$25 and costs for illegal possession of liquor and Glenn McCue, 26, of New Toronto \$50 and costs for obstructing a police officer July 14 after they were found guilty of the offences.

Markham Constable Robert Haddon said McCue put up an argument when the constable seized beer from a car on the Whitechurch Markham town line. He said McCue kicked the case of beer, broke it and started kicking the bottles into the bush before he took off into the underbrush with the comment, "Don't shoot me in the back." McCue who pleaded not guilty said the constable was wearing a raincoat over his uniform.

Brian Hunt of Toronto was sentenced to eight months definite and four months indeterminate Tuesday after he was found guilty of breaking into a Richmond Hill cleaners in July. Hunt was found guilty in Richmond Hill Magistrate's

Court after he was charged with the break-in and theft of some clothing from Cadet Cleaners, Yonge St., in the company with three other youths.

William Allan Currie, 17, pleaded guilty to the charge Tuesday and was remanded to August 13 pending a pre-sentence report. Hugh Genge who also pleaded guilty was remanded for one week and Albert Gil Langis was remanded one week for trial.

John William Roy Angliss who faces 15 counts of theft and driving charges, most of them laid by Markham Police, was given a further remand Tuesday to August 13.

Douglas James Crean, Will-

owdale, was fined \$10 and costs for illegal possession of alcohol as was David Ager, New Liskeard, and Lucien Frenette of Toronto. Frenette was also fined \$50 and costs or 10 days for driving without a valid driver's licence.
