A turkey shoot will be sponsored by the club in approximately six weeks — just right for Thanksgiving. Wonder if anyone has broken it to the turkeys yet?

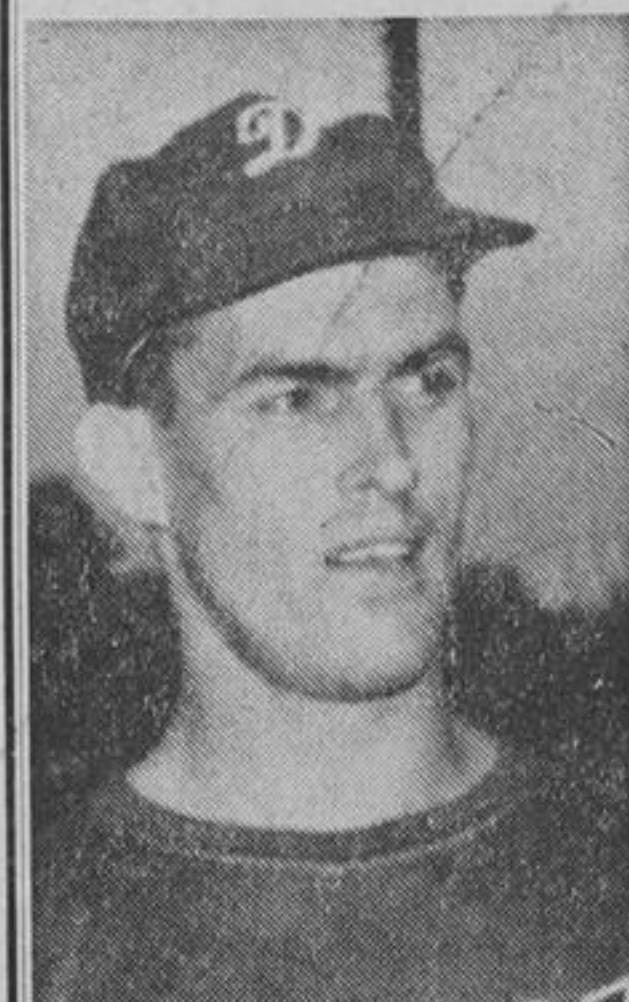

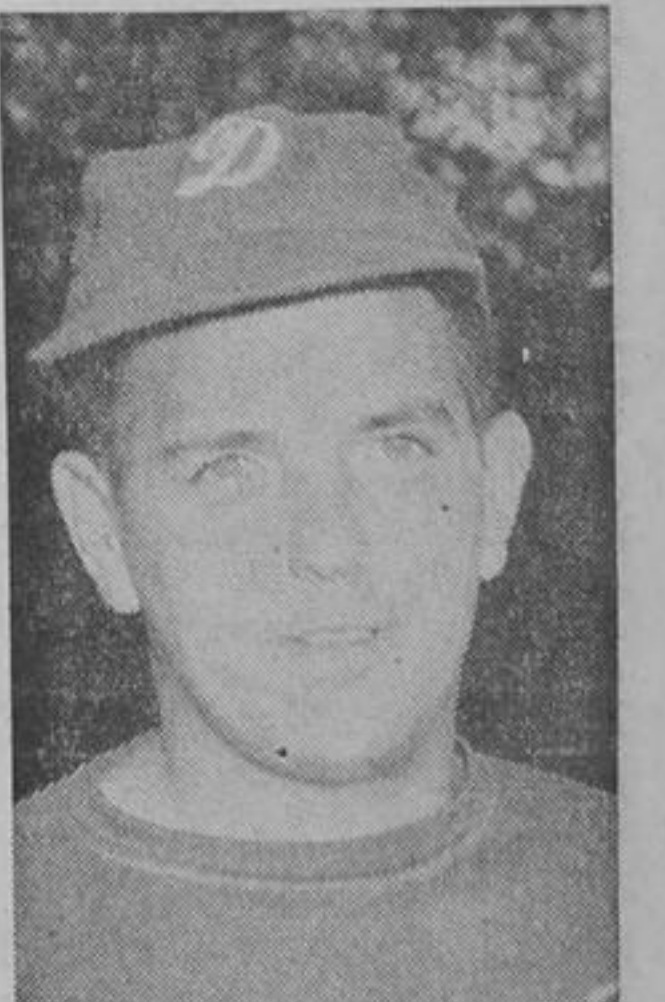

Brampton were the victims of the myth-breaking as Brent Selvage sent them away with just one hit. This hit represented the Brampton hit total for a two game series with the Jewellers.

Selvage was not alone in his fine pitching effort but got supportive support from his teammates. He struck out five and was never in any kind of trouble as Brampton never got a runner past second base. It was the first start at home for Brent Selvage this season and he proved that he is a competent mound craftsman.

The lone Brampton hit was a single by first sacker Don Cook with two men out in

the ninth inning. Dynes picked up 10 hits in the game with Moe Williamson poking out three singles in four trips to the plate. Neb Gayman belted Steffan hit for a double as Bill Robson, Frank Hughes, Ken Coulters and Brent Selvage notched singles.

Dynes scored a single run in the fifth inning and added two more in the eighth to head Brampton 3-0. The win moved the Jewellers into the second round of the O.A.S.A. Intermediate "A" Play-downs. This Thursday night the Jewellers will open the second round of the play-downs in Richmond Hill against the winner of a series between Chester Cleaners of Toronto and Robertshaw Cardinals of the Metro Major League.

11 P.M. CURFEW ON TOWN PARK LIGHTS

The lights on the main softball diamond in the Richmond Hill Town Park were recently used as a minor bone of contention. At a junior softball game the lights were suddenly turned out, precluding the completion of the game. The gentleman who turned out the lights said it was 11 p.m. and the turning out of the lights at that hour is mandatory due to a town by-law. The other gentleman concerned said that the time was 10:50 p.m. They're probably both right, depending upon the accuracy of their respective time pieces.

The turning out of the lights at the 11:00 p.m. time is done for a good and just reason. Undoubtedly the lights have a certain amount of nuisance value to the citizens residing in properties bordering on the park. There is also a certain noise factor which was taken into consideration when this by-law of 11:00 p.m. curfew was set.

Most softball games are set to start at 8:15 p.m. with a deadline time of 8:30 p.m. For the most part games do start within five or six minutes of the deadline time. When the by-law was drafted it was felt that two and one-half hours was enough to decide any well-played softball game. This time allowance still seems highly reasonable and proper. When you come near to using up all the time allotted there can be two causes. The game didn't start on time or the officials weren't getting the teams to hustle. No matter which reason is the real one, it still comes back to the game officials.

Undue delay or stalling tactics employed by one or both teams involved in a game can turn a potentially good game into a dull-as-dishwater affair. Delayed starts also cause a certain amount of unrest amongst spectators. They are highly critical of delays, and rightly so. The only reason they came at all was to see softball played. Arguments, deliberate stalling, and other devices used to stretch out a game only irritate them. It isn't too long before they start staying away to watch television where the programs always start and end on time. Like it or not, the spectator has to be considered at all times if softball is to continue to be a major sport in the Richmond Hill area.

The very fact of the lights being turned off at 11:00 p.m. was for spectator reasons. It was felt that by eliminating some of the nuisance factor citizens would gladly accept softball, and this has proved to be the case right down the line.

It wasn't too many years ago that a hundred people was a large crowd at a local softball game. By "selling" the game at every opportunity there isn't any doubt today that softball is the No. 1 spectator sport in this area. Crowds of 700 to 800 people are not uncommon and the numbers, if anything, are still on the increase.

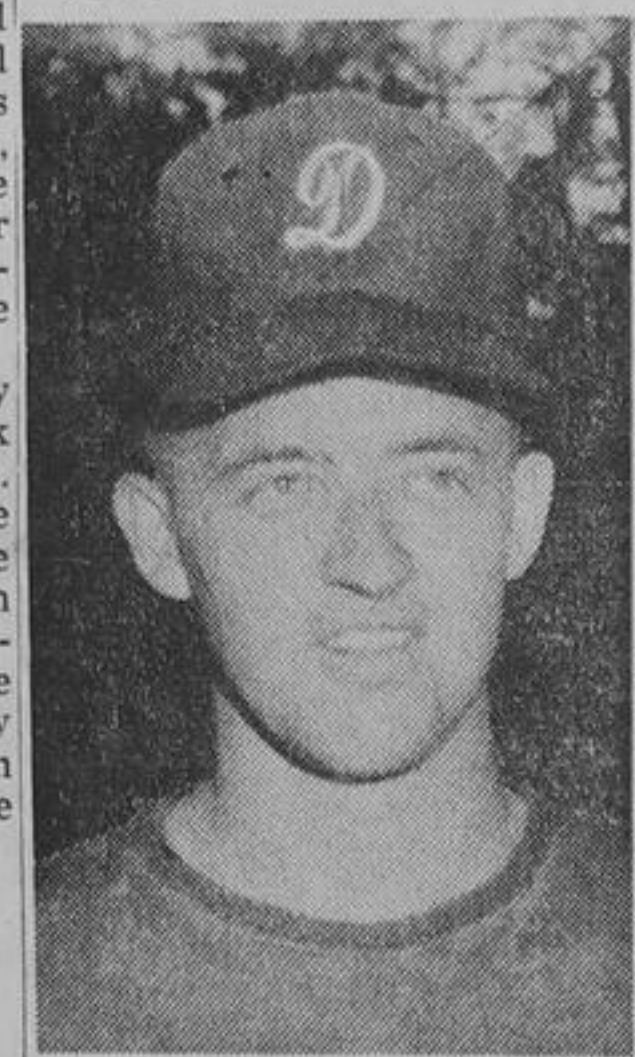
Cardinals Clobbered 10 To 1 By Jewellers

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Huge Pike Catch Richmond Hill United Breezes Under - Rated

Conservation Officer Harold Van Wyck reported a catch of an 18 lb., 43 1/2" northern pike from Lake Couchiching recently.

This is a good fish in anyone's book and makes one wonder whether this species hasn't been vastly underrated, said District Forester Arthur Leman of Maple. In the Lake Simcoe district, where the favored maskinonge is rare, the "northern" provides a great deal of sport. It can be taken by casting, trolling or still fishing with minnows, and taken from cold waters on light tackle, and can even give the best fisherman a tussle.

The prodigious appetite of the pike results in a fast growing fish which attains a length of 25" to 30" in five years. By the time they are 10 years old, the pike is 35" to 40" long and still weigh from 12 to 15 lbs. Fish over 40" in length are occasionally taken. It is the lure of the big fellow plus the ready availability of this fish, that makes it a favorite for the novice and experienced angler alike.

Some of the best waters for large pike, in this area, include Lake Simcoe, Lake St. John, Georgian Bay and the lower regions of the Nottawasaga River. In addition almost all of the smaller lakes contain fishable populations of the species.

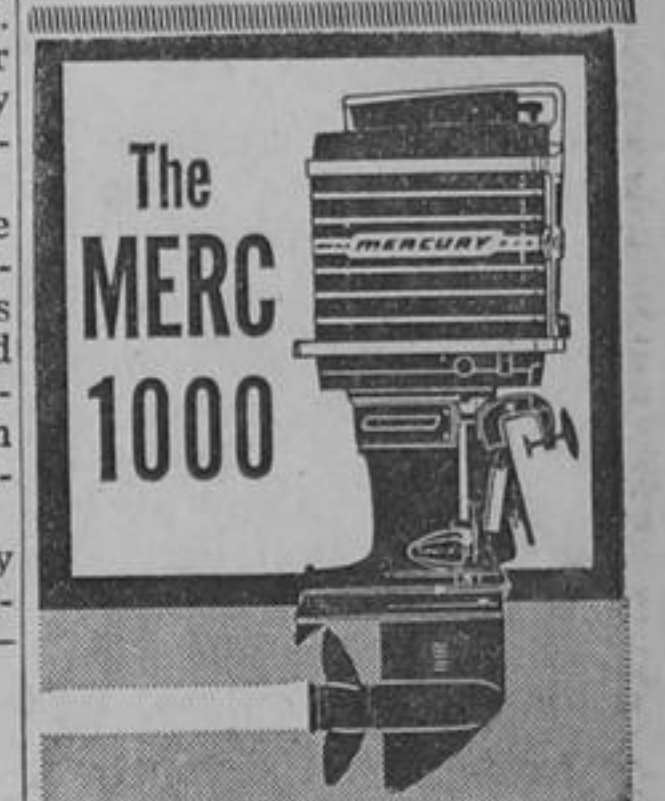
