Innovations this year were the "trade fair" sponsored by nine "business firms in the pavilion and a "mutt show" featuring all shapes and sizes of canine pets.

Association President Kenneth Chesney informed "The Liberal", exhibitors were pleased with the large number of visitors during the two-day show.

Nine business men participated and at least three more wished they had when the fair turned out so well, said Mr. Chesney. "We will start early next year to make arrangements. We expect many more firms will want to take part and some type of portable building or tent will be needed for displays."

Mr. Chesney estimated by the time bills were cleared, Lake Marie Association would show a \$500 profit from the carnival, which proved the best to date. Bingo was the best money-maker, clearing about \$80. Nearly 50 enthusiastic players at a time enjoyed the games at outdoor tables in the afternoon and in the small barn in the evening.
