Neighbours Protest Noise, Smell, Sight

Bylaw Charge Considered vs. Sale Operators

A Thornhill heavy equipment auction was put under police surveillance Tuesday to gather facts for possible breach-of-bylaw charges against property owner W. K. Beguley.

Beguley's Garage on Highway 7, where the sale of more than \$2,000,000 worth of bulldozers, graders, shovels, scrapers, loaders, trucks, tractors, miscellaneous tools and office equipment

began at 11 a.m. under industrial auctioneers White and Company, was the subject of talks between Vaughan Township Solicitor T. O. Fraser and municipal officials Wednesday afternoon.

At press time no charges had been laid. The matter came to a head at Monday night's Vaughan Council meeting when a delegation of about 15 Thornridge Drive homeowners descended on Deputy-reeve Jesse Bryson and Councillors G. W. Keffer and Garnet Williams demanding a stop to the racket caused by pre-sale activities on the lot adjacent to many of their homes.

For the past week, according to Delegation Spokesman Terry Goodwin, Thornridge Drive, prospective buyers have been testing the equipment from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. and later according to several neighbouring homeowners.

Mr. Goodwin said the property originally operated as a garage, has been fenced in with an eight-foot chain link fence and used as an open storage yard for wrecked cars. Neighbours also complained brilliant lights on the lot were disturbing their sleep.

Specifically referring to the Tuesday sale, Mr. Goodwin said the council should press for an injunction to stop it "since the operation has nothing to do with a garage."

Township Clerk Jim MacDonald said Police Chief James

Davidson and another constable inspected the property last Friday after sale advertisements were noted in the newspapers.

At the time it was agreed the use of the land was illegal and non-conforming under the by-law.

Deputy-reeve Bryson said an injunction was out of the question until a charge in magistrate's court had been laid. "To move too quickly would jeopardize the situation," he told the delegation.

ANTI-NOISE VIOLATION
He did order township police to go down to the lot Tuesday night and issue a warning that the pre-sale activities was violating anti-noise bylaw.

Several housewives among the delegation complained of the smell of diesel fuel, wrecking of their evergreens and that they weren't able to do their washing.

"HONEST MISTAKE"
Mr. MacDonald said Tuesday he thought holding the sale on the property was "an honest mistake" because the auction operators or the owner either weren't aware they were contravening the bylaw or if they knew, chose to ignore it.

He said that on Friday, the operators knew the charge would be laid but they had progressed too far to call off the huge sale.

According to Mr. MacDonald, the sale wasn't the success hoped for, as only about \$60,000 of the equipment was auctioned.

First \$100 Pledge For Proposed Pool

"Why are we passing the buck about the Richmond Hill swimming pool?" wonders Lion Cliff Bennett.

(Continued From Page 1) in the plan follow very closely the present industrial areas — one in Richvale, two in Langstaff, one in Thornlea-Green Lane area, one at Gormley, a small, new area south of Unionville, and a small industrial area at Mountjoy and Milliken. Total land designated for industrial use is 3,170 acres. The plan does not attempt to forecast the timing of development of urban and residential areas. Each stage is dependent on the substantial completion of the prior stage. The releasing of land for the various stages will depend on the maintenance of satisfactory industrial-residential ratio and adequate municipal water and sewage disposal facilities to permit this stage.

Classes Begin Brebeuf College September 9th

A secondary school named for the first Ontario educator more than 300 years ago will be attended by Richmond Hill, Thornhill and area Roman Catholic boys when classes begin September 9.

St. John Brebeuf College, named for the leader of the first Jesuit missionaries and located at 211 Steeles Avenue East, close to Bayview Avenue, will have grades 9 and 10 classes when it begins.

There is still room for more registrations, its rector, Rev. Father Alfred Colliard, Society of Jesus, said this week.

The college, in a modern \$1,000,000 building, is a private fee-operated inspected school and will include students from all of northern Metro and surrounding areas. There will be five grade 9 classes to begin and two grade 10's, and eventually will have all grades up to and including grade 13.

There will be 16 classrooms, four laboratories, a gymnasium and cafeteria, with a staff to begin of 11 Jesuit fathers and six lay teachers.

The school has been welcomed by families who in the past have had to send their sons a considerable distance to either De La Salle or St. Michael's College downtown.
