Corporation Of The Township Of Markham—By-Law Number 2005

A By-law to prohibit the making or establishment of pits and quarries.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF MARKHAM:

1. For grades 6, 7, 8 and auxiliary children living in Victoria Square and Gormley Area: A bus leaves Victoria Square at 7:45 a.m. and proceeds south along Don Mills Road to 17th Ave., returns north on Don Mills Road to Gormley, west on the Gormley Townline to the 3rd concession and south to No. 4 school.
2. All grades pick-up for children on Bayview Ave., south of 18th Ave., Headford north of 16th Ave.: Bus leaves Bayview Ave. and 18th Ave. at 8:20 a.m., proceeds south to 16th Ave., east on 16th to the 3rd, arriving at 16th Ave. and the 3rd Conc. at 8:40. Here this bus meets the one for Buttonville school and some transfers are made. Then it proceeds north on the 3rd concession through Headford to No. 4 school, continues north to the townline, thence east to Gormley and south on Don Mills Road to No. 7 school.
3. Children in the vicinity of Highway 7 have been inconvenienced with the widening of Don Mills Road to accommodate more traffic lanes near the corner. Crowning insult occurred when several driveways were torn up one afternoon just at 5 p.m. just as bread-winners were returning home. Jones' Grocereria was also left without proper access for several hours.
4. Allan Brown's 21st birthday was August 18 and his parents held a dinner party for him Friday evening. Allan has been on a camping vacation and this week accompanied the Maw family on holiday.
5. Mr. and Mrs. Adam Brown and Kathy spent a week with relatives at Wilson, N. Y., recently and last weekend entertained guests from Trenton. Kathy returned home with her Trenton cousins, for a brief holiday.
6. Roberta Storey is a camper at Ayslunyong this week.
7. Other travellers are Mrs. Richal Jones, who returned from a trip to Lake Placid and the White Mountains last week; Mrs. Dick Wardle, who spent last weekend in New York visiting a medical student niece who is studying there and the Clifford Cox family who visited the Manitoban family who visited the sulky races near Detroit early this week.
8. Young People's Union National School Representative Joy Fuller, a member of Victoria Square Charge Young People's Union and executive member of the York Presbytery Y. P. U., was one of 175 delegates representing rural and urban United Church congregations from Newfoundland to British Columbia attending the 1963 National Council being held at Olds, Alberta. Guests of other denominations will also attend.
9. The council, sponsored by the National Young People's Union, meets every two years, and this, the 11th council, will take place during the week of August 19-25, in the Olds School of Agriculture. It is the first time Council has met further West than Winnipeg.
