Trustees still must have O.M.B. approval of a \$72,000 debenture issue before starting work on the 330-foot well located in the Humber valley, a few hundred yards from the present two wells.

Since early summer three trustees, Chairman John Mann, Ronald Bolton and Ross Farquhar, have been considering the possibility of delaying the project until it could be undertaken under the government's winter works program.

They estimate village taxpayers could be saved \$11,500 if a winter works subsidy on labor can be obtained.

Village trustees were also notified of final approval for the installation of two new sidewalks on King Sideroad, near King City Composite School.

Department of Highways again approved the works for subsidy purposes, the same formality as last year.

Utah Disaster No doubt many of you have followed with interest the mine disaster at Moab, Utah. For one of our Gormley families, there was a time of great concern but also of great gratitude. Mr. Stephen Navin, twin son of Dr. and Mrs. S. J. Navin of Gormley, had just a few hours before the explosion occurred, left the mine as he had completed his shift, so narrowly missed the disaster. Stephen was employed with the Harrison International Co. and worked as a surveyor on the engineering staff. His work was done for the Texas Gulf Sulphur at the Crane Creek plant. The explosion occurred at a depth of 2,800 feet with only a few feet left to go to reach the potash. Only an act of God could prevent reaching the potash.

His twin brother, Francis, had spent several days with his brother the week-end previous to the disaster. He had toured the mine and had become acquainted with most of these men.
