Wait For O.M.B. Approval

(Continued From Page 1) of the present time.

He felt the complaints of the ratepayers were not sufficient to warrant the change from agricultural to industrial in the new official plan. "We have the good of the whole township to think about," he said. Township Planning Director Ron Forrest said the area lacked sewers at the present time and felt it "mostly lacked future potential." He added the situation had been discussed with

the parent Metro Planning Board which had no objection to the change.

Solicitor E. C. Newman, representing one of the opposing ratepayers, pointed to the concentration of industry development in the north section of Richmond Hill bordering on the present disputed area. He said his client "was only asking a logical continuation of industrial development to go north of Elgin Mills." He pointed out that Yonge Street North would be ideal for future industrial and commercial expansion.

Separate School Pupils Homeless

About 350 Richmond Hill pupils are temporarily "homeless" and will be for about three weeks with the delay in completion of the new St. Joseph's Separate School.

Blame for the delay has been placed mainly on a steel strike. About 170 pupils of Our Lady Help of Christians School in Beverley Acres — destined eventually for St. Joseph's — are presently attending classes at Our Lady school along with about 200 others from the Markham Road-Bayview Avenue areas.

Separate School Board officials said work on the unfinished school is being completed inside the building as well as landscaping on the outside.

In a letter distributed at Roman Catholic churches here the separate school board said pupils in grades 6, 7 and 8, would attend classes from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. as usual. Students from grades 1 to 5 in Our Lady Help of Christians school will attend classes from 8 a.m. to 12:15 p.m. and from the same grades in St. Joseph's from 12:15 to 4:30 p.m.

Thornhill Industrial Area

It was a change of pace — on the whole — for the township as ratepayers came forth to announce their approval of the new official plan — industrial zoning of land at Thornhill north of Meadowview Avenue. George Meador, of 162 Grandview Avenue, and president of the 172-strong Grandview Estates Ratepayers Association, said his group was in favor of the official plan. Adding his agreement also was Robert Briggs, of 1018 Highland Park Blvd. of the Highland Park Ratepayers Association. There were one or two dissenting ratepayers.

Paul Mingay, spokesman for residents in the Highland Park area, near Steeles and Yonge Streets, attempted to present evidence that a start had been made on development in the Thornhill industrial area number lots.

Under the proposed master plan, secondary plans for each undeveloped area would have to be presented to the provincial officials and could be the subjects of further Municipal Board hearings, under the old plan no such secondary plans are required.

In a preliminary breakdown

of the official plan, Mr. Forrest said it consisted of three stages. The first stage, he said, is approval of the official plan and maps and data followed by a secondary plan stage breaking down the over-all plan into detailed segments, and finally implementation of the secondary plan by zoning by-laws.

Over-All Plan Satisfactory In his final summation, Mr. Lucas said the over-all plan appeared to be satisfactory with only a few objections from ratepayers.

He asked that with the exception of a few adjustments mentioned during the hearing the official plan be approved as originally submitted to the board.

Schools At Peak Enrolment Tues.

Mr. McIntyre said by Tuesday most of the five schools' 124 principals, teachers and supervisors had visited classrooms to prepare for the opening. Pre-registration by newcomers to the area was at steady flow all last week.

Although final figures won't be available until later, high school enrolment is running as expected. At Thornhill Secondary School, no figures were available; Bayview Secondary School reports over 1,000 registered and at Richmond Hill High School, approximately 730 will be in class by the end of the week, slightly down from last year's enrolment.

Roman Catholic schools' enrolment is running about as expected. At Our Lady Help of Christians school, staggered classes are being held to accommodate the pupils waiting to enter the new St. Joseph's School expected to be ready by October 1. Total with the two schools is about 300 but the school was prepared and has enough teachers to handle the extra pupils.

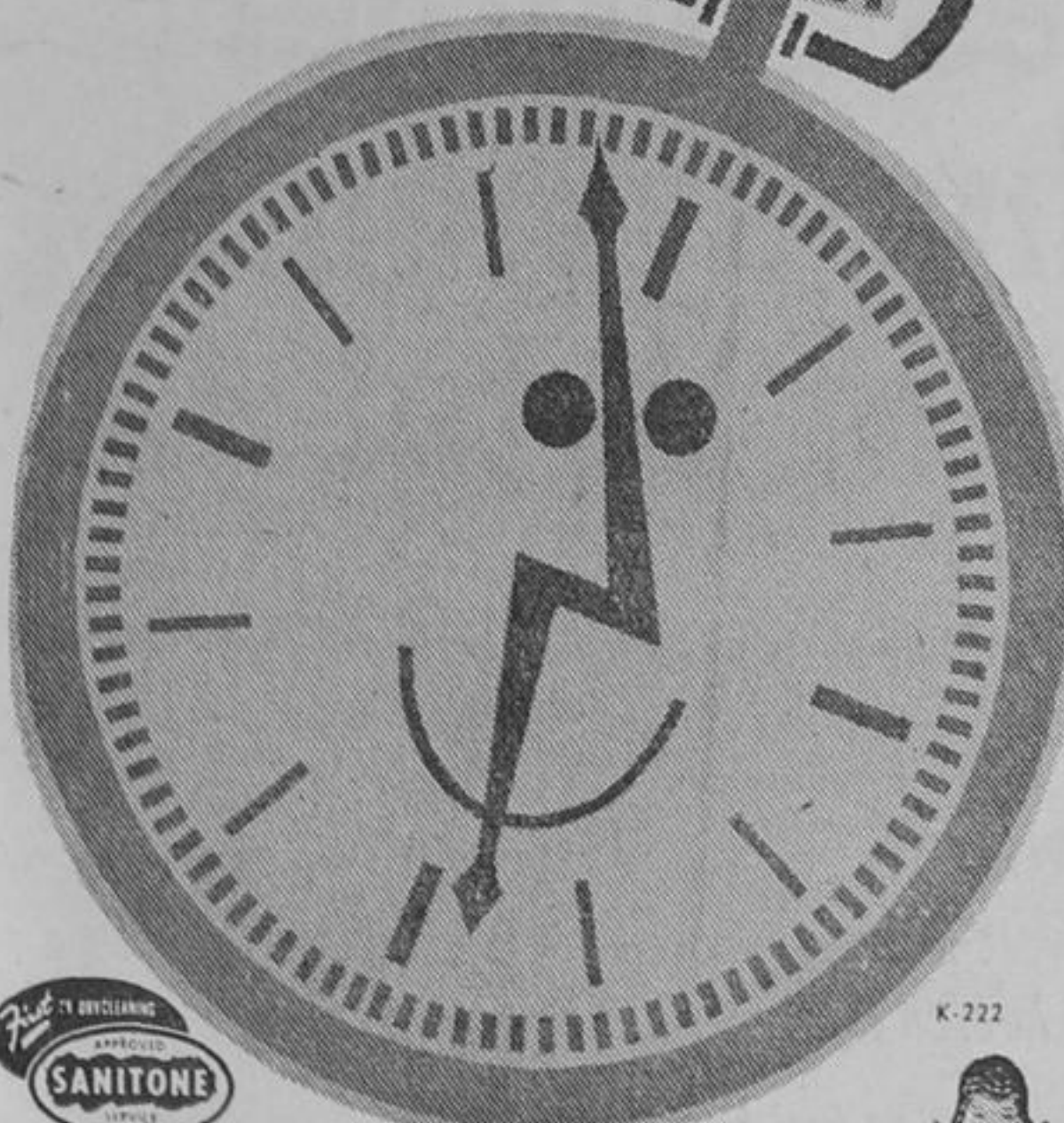
