St. Mary's Credit Union

The credit union movement is designed to help those who would otherwise be forced to "go to the money lender and endure exorbitant rates of interest on the money they borrow."

Making the statement was C. B. Logan, manager of St. Mary's (Richmond Hill) Credit Union Ltd., 286 Gells Road, Richmond Hill.

"Compare these usurious rates of interest," he said, "with the maximum credit union rate which is 12 per cent per annum and moreover where all net profits are returned to the membership in the form of dividends or rebate on interest."

He described a credit union as a group of people agreeing to save together and lend each other money at a reasonable rate of interest; a legal corporation chartered under the law as a non-profit organization to serve members only; and a service to help you in the practical ways that count most—making use of your money to the maximum in your interest.

"We should condemn the usurious money lender with his excessive rates of interest and bonus system and practice the brotherhood of many by joining or organizing co-operative banks in which to satisfy our credit needs and where there is no hidden interest rates," he said.

"In Richmond Hill, St. Mary's Credit Union Ltd., offers such a service to people within a five mile radius of the post office. The credit union is people helping people, not for profit but for service regardless of race, color or creed."

5 Year Jail Term Thornhill Theft

James Abbott, 31, of Toronto last Thursday in Richmond Hill Magistrate's Court was sentenced to five years in jail following conviction on a charge of theft from a Thornhill doctor's office.

Court was told Abbott who was charged with stealing \$175 after he broke into the home office of Dr. Norheim, Yonge Street, that the accused man had a lengthy record and that the motive for the break-in was a desire for drugs.

Magistrate O. S. Hollinrake said there was no point giving Abbott a short term because he couldn't be effectively treated for his affliction.

Abbott was first convicted of theft at the age of eight in Quebec and was sentenced to two years less a day for his crime.

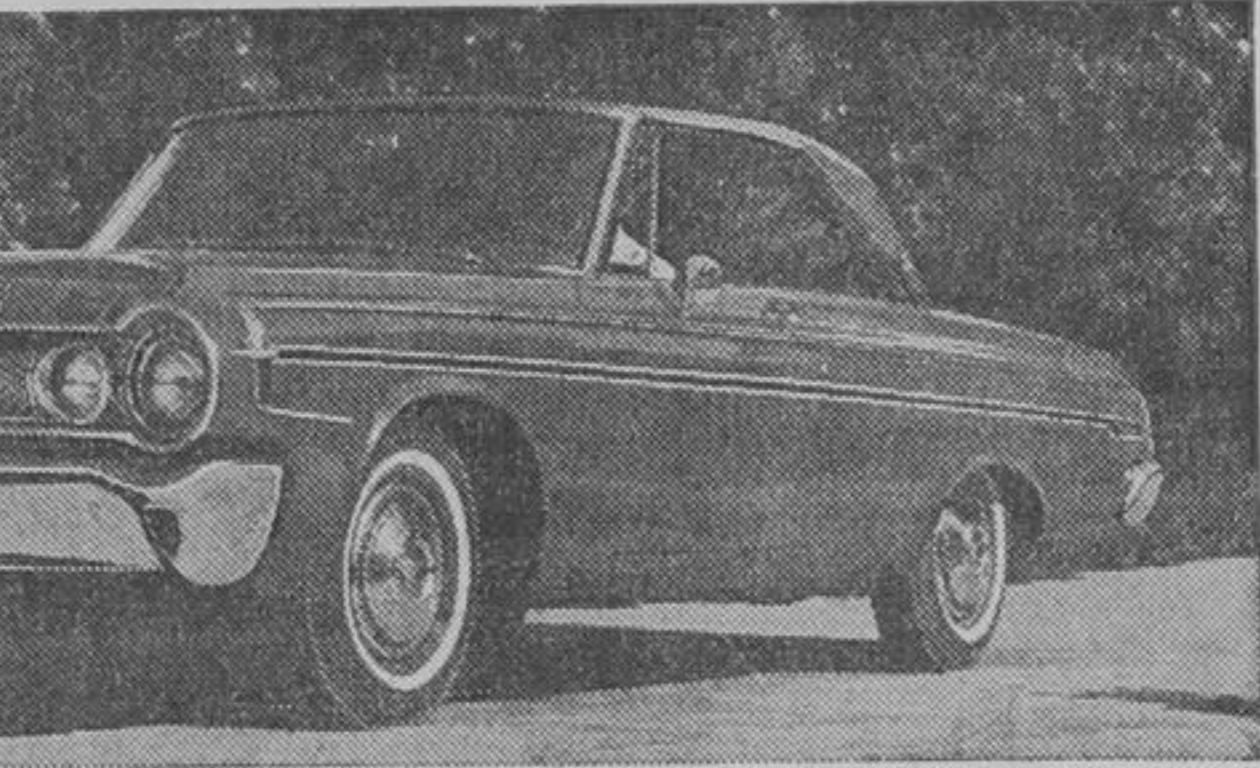

Council Briefs

Some Objections To Pit By-Law

An "exception clause" in Markham Township's new by-law prohibiting the making of pits and quarries in the township has brought forth some protests.

The clause in the by-law prohibits pits except two already established ones: Markham Sand and Gravel Company Limited and Hill Gravel Limited.

After hearing the letters of protest from several gravel pit operators council decided to include one of the operators, Sabiston Sand Pit at German Mills, as the only other exception to be added to the bylaw.

The motion read that with the exception of Sabiston's all other objections be forwarded to the Ontario Municipal Board for its decision.

An amendment to the motion by Councillor Stewart Rumble that two other pit areas, Horner and Grove, also be included in the exceptions to the by-law was defeated.

Protests to the municipal board will likely result in the board calling a hearing to hear the objections of those left off the "exception" clause.
