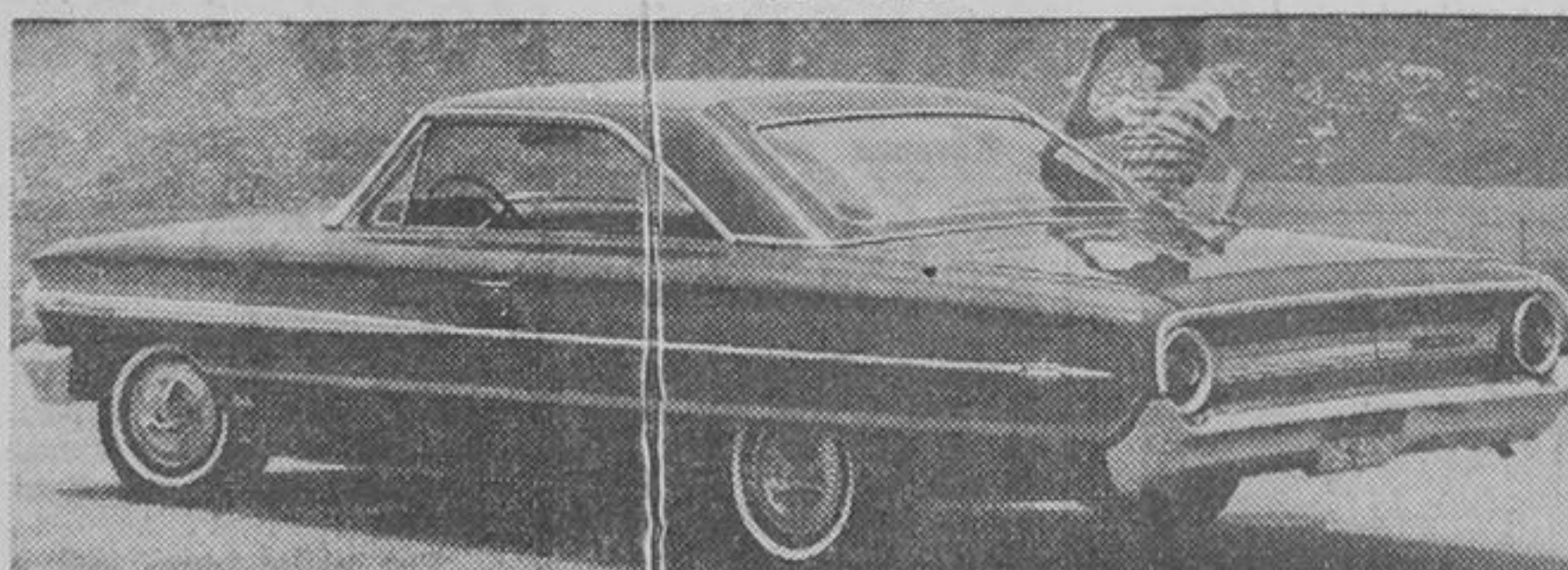
Happy Birthdays
