## From Etobicoke Eight Hundred Young Vocalists Company Limited in central Present Spring School Concert

Eight hundred Richmond Hill public school children will lift their young voices in song at a special music night being planned now for April.


School music supervisor Herman Fowler Monday night told Richmond Hill School Trustees he feels the community should hear the best of what is being done in the music program in the six town public schools.

Dates of the event are April 14 and April 21 and Bayview Secondary School has been booked for the concert. Each night about 400 students will perform in choirs, triple trios, ensembles and individually and the evenings will be highlighted with a massed choir of about 200 selected voices. There will be interludes of folk dancing. This is the first time this type of project has been undertaken since the days when it was attempted at the old arena.
