Some hardy souls were out trolling for pike and bass. Little action was reported but fishermen report that they know the big ones are there and can be had. All they have to do is try.



A Cisco Kid, a Harvey Spoon, a red and white or a worm harness are all good lures for the wily lunge. Trolling nice and slow near weed beds in 5 to 12 feet of water should produce results if the lunge is lurking in the area at all.
