There are mallards and blacks in quantity and, if this year runs true to form, several thousand duck-happy hunters will flood into the area, north and west of Arthur. If you can get away during the week why not by-pass the opening day and enjoy comparatively uncrowded conditions later in the week.

**Turkey Shoot**  
On opening day why not have a crack at the Cedar Rod and Gun Club turkey shoot and try your skill with fellow outdoor lovers? Action starts at 10 a.m. at the Bayview Cedars Horse Ranch, Bayview and 19th Avenues and targets are worth \$1.00 each. Door prizes and other attractions are offered to make this the most deluxe turkey shoot yet!

**Wild Geese**  
Several flights of geese were observed in local areas over the weekend. Zephyr Swamp, Uxbridge Swamp and the area around Bradford were the flyways with over 300 geese involved in the sightings.

**Ponds in this area are being hunted but not too many of the wily ducks are being bagged. There are plenty of mallards in the Simcoe area despite the low water conditions prevailing in the swamplands. With snow already falling in the northern parts of the province, lakes within 100 to 150 miles of this area should be duck hunter's paradise.**

**Good Fishing**  
Fishermen can still go out after that big lunker 'lunge with the odd pickerel thrown in as a sort of fringe benefit. Anyone fishing the Kawarthas could combine two operations in one. Duck hunt in the morning and fish in the afternoon and evening. Chances are you won't get skunked both ways.

The Nottawasaga River has a nice rainbow run on the go. Recommended lures are a mepps or number two mepps, either silver or brass — one of each is a good idea — or a copper coloured half-wave should produce fish.
