Total resources on September 30, 1962, were \$1,500,833 and they included \$457,045 held for specific purposes. The balance totaling \$1,043,788 was all the society had to defray the cost of its programme in the six months prior to the April 1963 campaign. The society has no other funds.

York Central Trustees At Quebec Conference

York Central High School Area parents needn't feel local discrepancies in the numbers attending high school and those finally entering university are so singular. Superintendent Sam Chapman said.

"We fit right into the overall picture," Mr. Chapman said in a comment on one of the keynote addresses on education statistics at the Canadian Educational Association's conference in Quebec City last week.

Attending the conference, which included representation from the 10 provinces, departments of education, administrators, inspectors and trustees were Mr. Chapman, and York Central Trustees John Honsberger, Lewis Clement and Ernest Redelmeier.

The conference, in the form of panels and workshops, ended last Saturday.

Mr. Chapman said a good deal of the briefs made were in both English and in some cases halting French but that delegates at least attempted to be bilingual.

Among topics were experiments in making entrance examinations and school planning standard, improvements in classroom techniques and

making high school education possible for all.

One American speaker emphasized what was being taught today in science was its history rather than the discovery of new facts.

"This is having some impact in the U.S. and will have some effect here. With this in mind, parents might not have so much objection to what seems like too much switching of new method textbooks," Mr. Chapman said.

Reports from the conference will be circulated among various high school departments and discussed.

Should Stop Fighting For Rights Start Doing, York County UWC Told

Women have to stop fighting for their rights and take up the responsibilities which go with them.

This was the advice of a woman, Mrs. M. J. Sabia, of St. Catharines, vice-president for Central Ontario of the University Women's Club. She was addressing the opening meeting of the York County University Women's Club in Newmarket.

Mrs. Sabia appealed to club members to play a more effective role in public life especially in molding public opinion.

"We Canadians have more leisure than any other country in the world yet how effective are we outside our homes?"

She noted how few women there are in any area of the nation's economic and political life when it is the economic factor that controls their lives.

"We must be more knowledgeable about taxation, government subsidies, and our legal rights. We must forget our personal identity and join with other women's organizations who are interested in the same problems."

Briefs Invited on the Subject of the Proposed MEDICAL SERVICES INSURANCE

The Government of Ontario has appointed an Enquiry which:

1. Having regard to the maintenance of the physical and material well-being of the people of Ontario, and the social, economic and health benefits to be achieved through the establishment and operation of a feasible medical services insurance programme, shall...

Examine and enquire into, hold meetings for the study and discussion of, receive representations in connection with matters related to, and consonant with, the basic principles, purposes and objectives of Bill 163 of the 1962-63 session of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario respecting Medical Services Insurance.

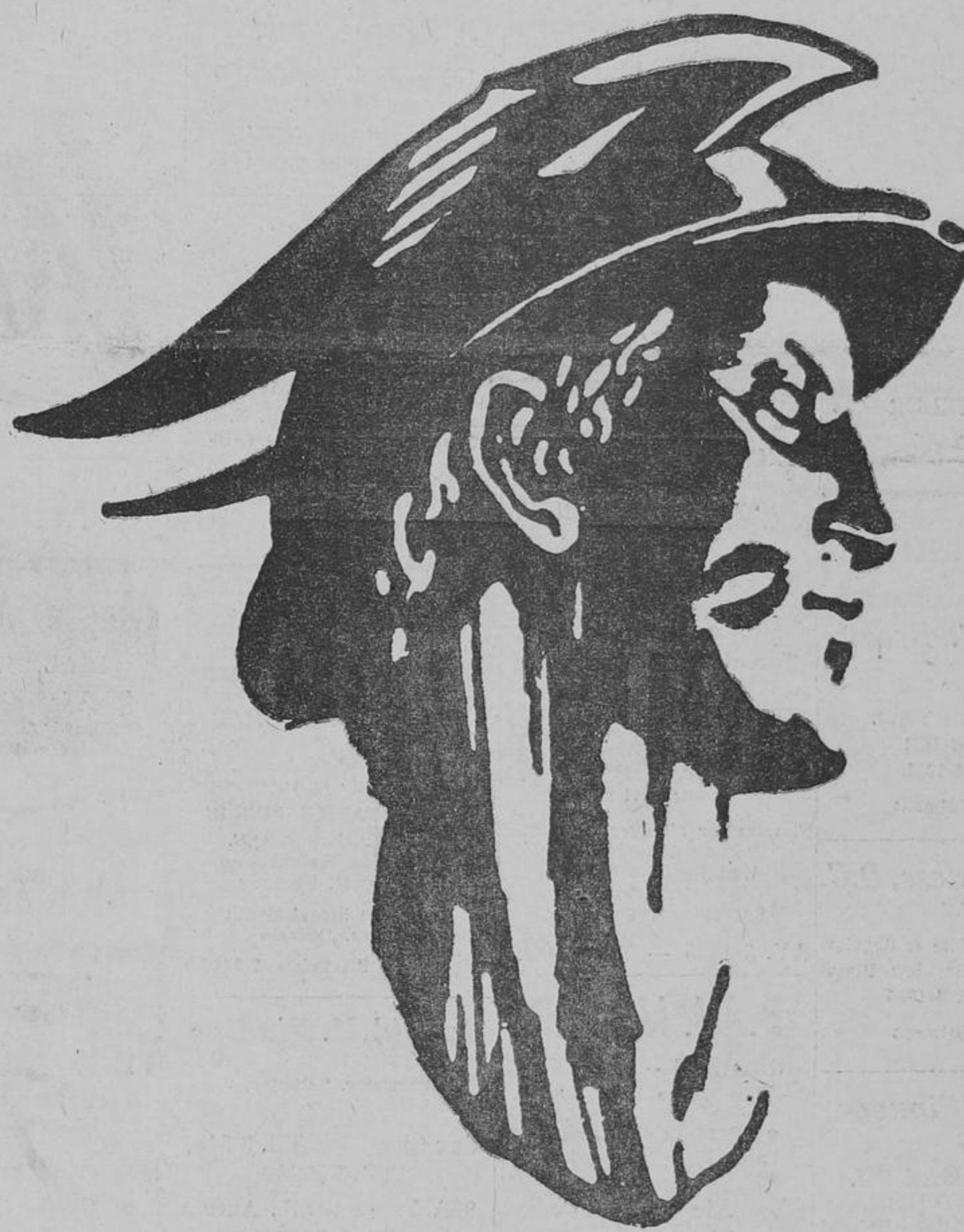
2. After due study and consideration, to make recommendations and report upon matters enquired into under the terms set out herein as the commissioners see fit to the Prime Minister and Executive Council of Ontario.

Notifications of intention to file briefs should be submitted on or before October 11th and actual briefs (25 copies) no later than November 15th to the Secretary.
