## New 1964 Olds Shows Compact,

Oldsmobile for 1964 is introducing the Jetstar 88, a lower-priced companion to the high performing Dynamic 88 and Super 88. It was announced today by General Motors of Canada. The new series is powered by the Jetfire Rocket ultra-high compression, 330-cubic-inch engine, and may be seen at Wilson-Niblett Motors Ltd., Richmond Hill.

In addition a sports-car version of the Jetstar, called Jetstar I, powered by the ultra-high compression Starfire engine is being introduced.

The Jetstar 88 utilizes the full-size Oldsmobile body on a special 123-inch wheelbase chassis. Its weight is reduced, its styling is trim, and it utilizes the new light-weight cast-iron Jetfire Rocket V-8 engine.

There are many other new and wonderful things about the 1964 Oldsmobiles. Styling is brilliant, fresh and new, with the accent on youthful appearance.

Each series is highlighted by the use of specific grilles, rear bumpers, rear quarters, tail-lamp assemblies and the placement and shape of accent trim, including newly designed rocker panel moldings.

The Starfire has been dramatically changed. The rear roof supporting structure is designed to further stress the sharp, crisp lines of the concave rear window. In the lower body a functional engine compartment air outlet is placed directly behind the front wheel opening. Inboard driving lamps are sports-car styled.

## Children's Films Shown New Season Launched

Saturday October 5th at 10 o'clock will see the start of yet another season of special entertainment films for children sponsored by the Richmond Hill Films for Children committee, a group formed of members of the Library Club of Richmond Hill High School and interested parents in the community. The past three seasons have proved increasingly popular and to meet the increasing demand for season tickets a move has been made to the auditorium of Richmond Hill High School in order that more children can be accommodated.

To those new to these special films for children, all the films shown are made by the Children's Film Foundation, an organization that has made extensive studies as to just what appeals most to children in the way of adventure films - the

settings of these films is in various part of the world and the leading characters are always delightfully natural children of all ages and nationalities. Each of the seven programmes to be seen during the season consists of one full length film plus one episode of an exciting mystery serial, and the complete programme lasts approximately an hour and a quarter. There are always a few seats reserved for parents (no charge is made for adults) who wish to view the reactions of the young audience to these specially made films.

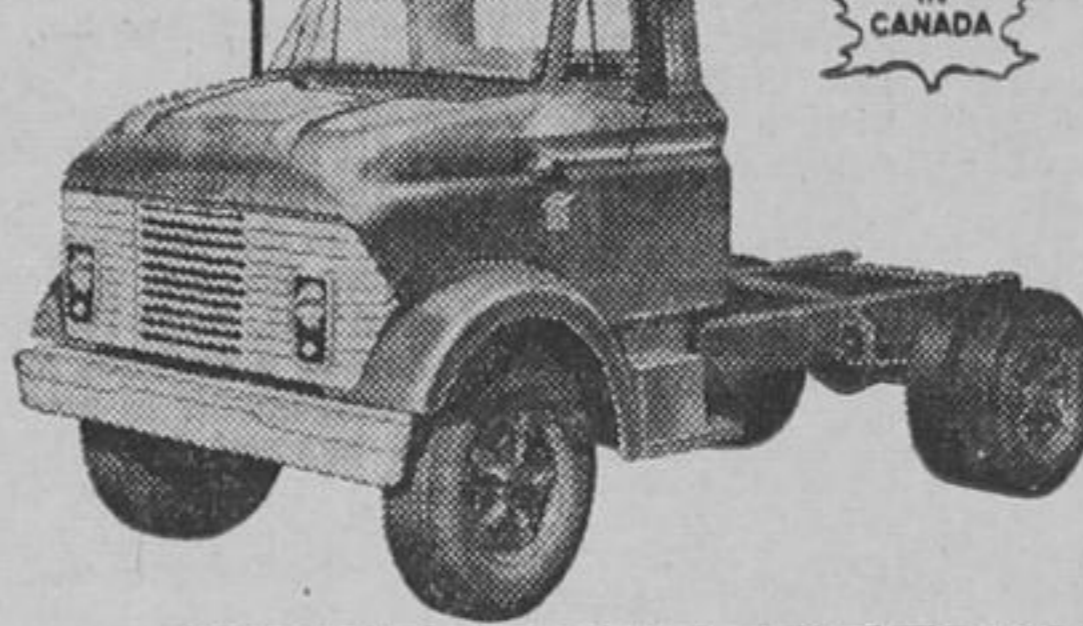

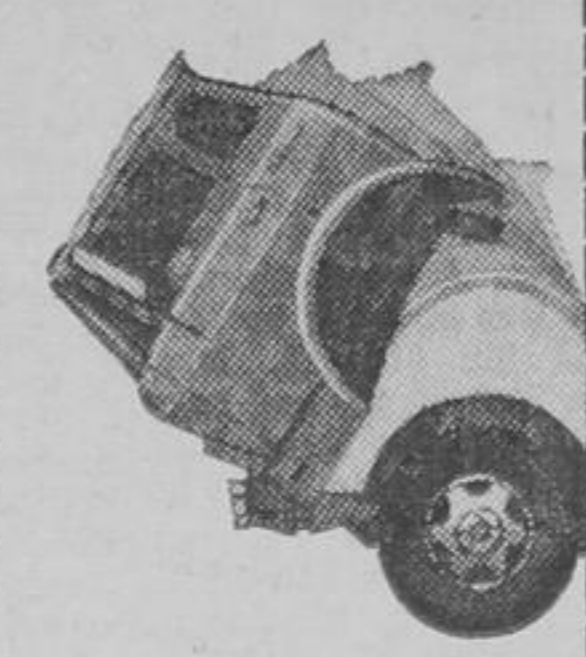
