Two Face Sentence On 15 Charges

Two Richmond Hill youths next Thursday will face sentence in magistrate's court after conviction October 3 on joint charges of theft and damage here and in Markham Township.

Wayne Toole, Alsace Rd., and Joseph Raymond Francis Deschambeault, Yonge Street South, pleaded guilty to each of the 15 charges.

A charge of possession of stolen goods laid against Alvin Glenfield of the same address as Deschambeault was withdrawn.

Deschambeault also pleaded guilty to possession of an offensive weapon and a

sawed off .22 calibre rifle with a barrel of less than 20 inches.

Entered as exhibits during last Thursday's trial were a large, eight-inch curved blade knife and a home-made gun.

Damage included breakage of glasses at the Richmond Hill Curling Club, windows in several service stations and equipment in the interiors of St. Mary Immaculate School and Cook's B.P. Station. The charges arose after the pair were arrested at the curling club September 19 and date back to mid-August.

Cook's B. P. Station was

entered three times, the third through the freshly-painted window its owner kept replacing after each incident, court was told. At St. Mary's School, the teaching staff's symbol of discipline, a black strap, was cut up in pieces and placed on a desk.

Approximately \$175 in cash was taken from the school, about \$115 from a cash register and cash box removed from Joe's Service Station August 18, about \$17 from Gabriel's Service Station, a wrist watch from the Canadian Spawn and Supply Company, golf equipment from the North Yonge Driving

Range, \$15 from Cook's and 20 packages of cigarettes.

Constable Harry Coldron said the knife found near where the arrest was made had been used as a jimmy.

The gun was found in a search of Deschambeault's lodgings the next day, Const. Coldron told court.

He said both had been very co-operative with police.

Magistrate O. S. Hollinrake ordered a pre-sentence report on the pair. Toole was represented by Joseph Rabinowitch and Deschambeault by John Lawlor.
