Markham Township Says Okay For Watermain On Don Mills

Markham Township stamped its approval Monday on proposed installation of a \$76,970 six-inch watermain on Don Mills Road but not before Councillor Charles Hoover did some soul-searching.

Cost of the installation will be paid by charging frontage rates to properties receiving benefit from the main. It will be laid on a line north of John Street through Highway 7 to the north line of Lot 14.

Councillor Hoover stated he felt "the cost is too high what with the increasing costs of education. We won't be able to hold it at the rate we're going."

Acting Reeve Charles Hooper said the water question on Don Mills Road had been dragging for a number of years and felt "we should okay the installation and give the people concerned a chance to say 'yes' or 'no'."

Deputy-reeve Allan Summer agreed it should "be let go through. The people," he said, "will get a chance to object."

Councillor Hoover countered the rest of the township would have to "underwrite it if the people it concerns can't pay it."

Clerk H. C. T. Crisp said the approval would be advertised and if anyone objected the OMB would call a public hearing to hear complaints before allowing the work to continue.

"This water question has been going for three or four years," added Mr. Hooper, "and most of the people want it and it has to be paid for."

Councillor Hoover finally voted for the motion to leave it up to the residents to protest.

It was at the previous meeting that council rejected proposals to install 12-inch mains instead of six-inch ones.

Cost of installing the larger ones would be about \$20,000 more and couldn't be done on frontage rates alone.

Mr. Summer objected to having any of the cost taken out of the whole water area rate.

Engineer Dusan Miklas favoured the larger watermain because of its advantages to new industry which could come into the area.

Rare Medal Found

When digging a post hole on the premises of Otto Pick and Sons Seeds Ltd., Yonge Street North, a workman found a coin shaped piece of metal about the size of a large one cent piece, and of a similar metal.

One side of the object bears the date 1812 and the other the inscription "Isaac Brock, Hero of Upper Canada." Other parts of the inscription are not decipherable, except for the word "Peace."

A Toronto coin dealer identified the find as a token or medal, probably issued to commemorate the end of the War of 1812-15, in which the gallant Brock lost his life. He was mortally wounded as he led a handful of British regulars and volunteers up Queenston Heights against an American force of vastly superior numbers. The skirmish ended with the invaders being driven from Canadian soil, and the defenders occupying the heights.
