## Important Meetings At St. Mary's Anglican

Two parish meetings last week were attended by some 300 members of St. Mary's Anglican Church. The rector and churchwardens presented the building and financial plan for the new St. Mary's-On-The-Hill at each meeting. An attractive brochure was available outlining the parish progress from 1872 until now. The parish needs for the next eight years were outlined for study and support.

The meetings began with dessert and coffee and an opportunity to meet new Assistant Curate Reverend Donald Bone and his wife. Afterwards, Mr. Munroe Ashkanase, chairman of the programme of advance, reviewed the building plans which were shown on coloured slides by Mr. Lou Wainwright, visitation chairman.

Rector's Warden W. R. Kedwell presented the financial plan which Mr. Grant Farwell and his committee of finance had worked out with the guidance of the synod of the diocese. People's Warden Herb Montgomery presented the case for 'how' it can be done with the slogans 'more people giving more' and 'more people giving'.

It was shown that with 500 parishioners using envelopes 'according to their means' the programme for St. Mary's could be met without undue strain on anybody.

The Bishop of Toronto, the Right Reverend F. H. Wilkinson, in his letter of commendation to the congregation said, 'you have a great opportunity to prove what a congregation with vision and determination can do'.

Rector Rev. James O'Neill declared his encouragement in serving a parish which had the faith and vision to make big and often painful decisions in the name of the Lord. He pointed out that this was essentially a venture of faith and the plan was being presented simply and directly on this basis. Every member of the parish is being asked to assess his loyalty and devotion to the church during this month.

At the end of the meeting a warm expression of appreciation was given to the rector for his leadership over the last six years.

Don Little was in charge of the meeting arrangements and Jim McRae of publicity. Mrs. W. S. Pocknell convened the many women who assisted as hostesses either on the telephone or at the meetings. Mrs.
