#### York Farmers Not Panicked By Hot Spell

York County farmers have not yet pushed the panic button in the face of threatened continued drought and higher than avage temperatures.

According to George Arnold, assistant Department of Agriculture representative in Newmarket, county farmers he had talked to didn't have any worries about their fall wheat

Mr. Arnold said, however, if the situation continued for two or three weeks, the picture might change.

According to other reports, some Ontario farmers have been forced to pay as much as 10 cents a gallon for irrigation water. York farmers are in the most cases using drilled wells for irrigation.

York has a fairly large percentage of its agricultural land plowed in fall wheat, Mr. Arnold said. A long-term lack of rain would also affect next year's hay crop.

The hot dry weather in western and southwestern Ontario has made ploughing difficult, curtailed cheese production, created a sugar beet storage problem, and threatened the wheat crop. In northern Ontario, the drought has created a serious fire hazard.


