He pointed out that no employable men or women are receiving relief. He stated that welfare costs are on the budget! or slightly under it, and claimed that York Manor has eased the situation by accepting several residents who had previously been maintained in private nursing homes. At present, he said, there are 17 or 18 residents of Richmond Hill in the county home for the aged. Councillor Campbell paid tribute to the excellent work of


