### Crothers Plant Is Pilot Project For Natural Gas

The George W. Crothers plant in Leaside, once mooted to be moving to Vaughan Township, has become the pilot project for an all-natural gas, electrical and heating system. For several months the plant has obtained its electricity for lighting, motors and heavy arc welding from a Caterpillar reciprocating engine powered by natural gas with the normally wasted heat from the engine used to heat the building.

The plant introduces to Canada the new concept of total energy from gas; pioneering research is by Consumers' Gas, Trans-Canada Pipe Lines Ltd. and Crothers.

There are at present about 10 total energy plants similar to Crothers in operation in North America. About 20 are under construction, and 50 more are in the planning stage. Apartments, hotels, motels, shopping centres, department stores, hospitals, office buildings, banks, manufacturing plants and many others lend themselves to new energy systems.

There will be a discussion of the new system at the Queen Elizabeth Building at the C.N.E. today (Thursday).
