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Says Jesse Bryson

Planning Study Involves York Only

Vaughan Deputy-reeve Jesse Bryson told York County Council a \$5,000 planning study of its 14 municipalities is being done without the knowledge or assistance of Metro planners.

Mr. Bryson, chairman of the county's planning committee who last week announced Murray Jones and Associates of Toronto were hired as planning consultants to make the study said it was for York County as it exists today.

"The whole planning situation is rather complex.

If we were 100 miles from Toronto, we wouldn't have the problems we do today. The growth of Southern Ontario extending from the cities affects every one of us," he said.

York County has been unable to be organized as a planning area because its southern municipalities, Richmond Hill, Villages of Markham, Stouffville, Woodbridge and Vaughan and Markham Townships are under the jurisdiction of the Metro Planning Board.

Mr. Jones was Metro planning director from 1955 to 1962 until he formed his own firm of consultants.

He has been requested to evaluate economic, political and

social backgrounds of the 14-member municipalities and determine their present and future roles within both the framework of the county adjoining counties and Metro.

From this analysis should come alternatives in administration which would deal with anticipated needs and the size, responsibility and annual costs over a 10-year period. If such adjustments might have to be made.

Existing planning facilities are also to be covered in the report, expected to take four months.

The consultants will also be asked to determine how and when such a change, if required, would take place.

Report in French Stymies County; Dales Saves Day

York County Council made a somewhat unsuccessful stab at being bilingual at its last Wednesday session in Newmarket.

As part of the planning committee's report on the Canadian Planning Association's Quebec conference, a portion of the text was in French, since bilingualism was stressed at the conference.

Markham Township Reeve Charles Hooper commented, "How can we adopt it if we can't even read it?"

Newmarket Deputy-reeve Carolyn Ion did a masterful job of translating the passage in which Charles Michaud of Quebec asked all Canadians to be united in their efforts for Canada's 1967 centennial.

North Gwillimbury Reeve Joseph Dales then read the passage in French amid the applause of fellow councillors and commented, "Boy, if my high school French teacher could hear me now!"

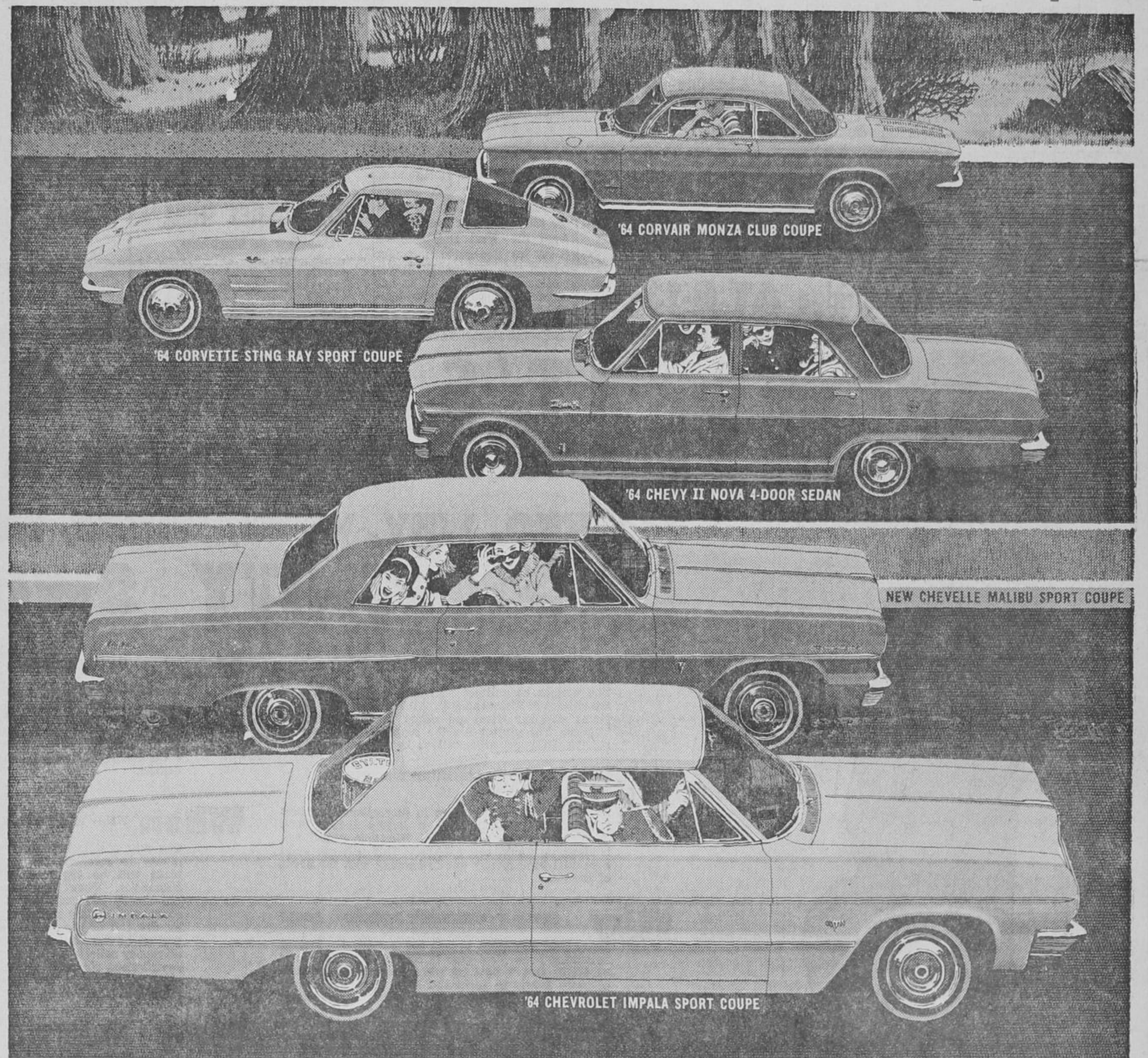
