A Toronto public school vice-principal and a science consultant told Maple parents the problem facing teachers today is how to prepare children for the coming era of automation.

Ralph Belfrey an anthropology major from the University of Toronto who was a critic teacher at Ontario Teachers' College, science consultant for Toronto School Board and at present vice-principal of McMurrich Public School addressed George Bailey Home and School Association's second meeting.

He pointed out science as well as all other subjects is on the move. "Educators are constantly trying new teaching methods and adopt only those that prove beneficial to the largest number of pupils". "It is important to have good teachers," he said.


