



**Residents Asked
Cut Water
Use**

King City residents have been asked by village trustees to cut water consumption in half during the next few months' critical water shortage.

The \$72,700 project of developing a third well in the Humber Valley has now been approved as a winter works project.

By delaying start of the well a few weeks until November 1 so the project would be eligible for labor subsidy, Trustees expect to save taxpayers about \$11,000.

International Water Supply Company, which received the contract to bring in the deep well, has been moving equipment into the site.

As an emergency measure, the new test hole has been providing 25 gallons a minute, pumped into the exhausted second well and circulated through the waterworks system. Household water pressure in taps since the auxiliary supply was introduced.

Trustee Ross Farquhar predicted the village will be short of water until spring and cautioned the 1,900 residents to conserve water carefully.

School Board Nominations Monday

Nominations for four public school trustees one from each ward in the town and three separate school trustees will be held in conjunction with the town nominations next Monday night. Nominations will be received between the hours of 7:30 and 8:30 p.m. in the auditorium of the Richmond Hill High School.

In 1963 two trustees from each ward were elected to the Richmond Hill Public School Board with one serving a two year term and one serving for one year only.

Mr. Basil G. Pappas, who has served one year as a ward 1 trustee after receiving an acclamation in last December's election, told "The Liberal" that he had learned a lot about the school board's business in the past year, and hoped that he had been able to contribute something to its work. He will be seeking re-election.

Mrs. Ruth Castle, the retiring trustee for ward 2 has served on the board for the past three years, being chairman of the personnel and planning committee for the past year. A Jack Knott, ward 4. They will homemaker. Mrs. Castle has come up for re-election next year.

Ward 1 is that part of the town lying between Yonge Street and Bayview Avenue north of Crosby Avenue.

Ward 2 lies between Yonge and Bayview and Crosby Avenue and Markham Road.

Ward 3 lies between Yonge and Bayview and south of Markham Road.

Ward 4 is all that part of the town west of Yonge Street.

The Richmond Hill Separate School Board has not adopted the ward system for its election. Three members of the board are completing their two year term of office this December. All three will be standing for re-election.

Mrs. Marjorie Gleason, Church St. S. has been a member of the board for the past 10 years, and during that time has served as secretary-treasurer. She intends to stand for re-election.

John Leclair, Alper Street, has been a member for the past two and a half years and is the present vice-chairman. He was

appointed to fill a vacancy on the board in June 1961, and at the annual election that year received an acclamation. He hopes that he will be able to continue to serve the board for another term.

Gordon R. Trussler, 27 Cartier Crescent, chairman of the board, will also seek re-election. Other trustees on the six-member board who will come up for election next year are Robert Steele, Con Thompson and William Parker. Mr. Thompson is leaving the board in order to contest the Ward 1 town council seat.
